

IMPARTIAL ASSESSMENTS.

One of the most crying evils of the present time is the method of assessing property by which the poor man is made to bear the burdens of taxation while the rich, comparatively speaking, escape.

Much of the discontent and the uneasiness and restlessness in labor circles arises from this source. Last fall Oakland elected an assessor on the plank of equal taxation, and since he came into office the increased value of the corporation property and the business blocks will be raised many millions.

Dalton was an Independent candidate and at the last election was opposed by both parties and the press. He was elected by a large majority. During the campaign he promised that he would decrease taxes of the man of small means in Alameda county at least 25 per cent.

In this county the same feeling elected Kinney assessor, and the people are now looking to him for a more equitable adjustment of tax values, than they have seen for the last twenty years in Ormsby.

ALLEN OF EUREKA.

In another column is published a card from Mr. Allen of Eureka, denying the statement made by the APPEAL that he said on the floor of the House that he was not a Silver man.

The writer did not hear the utterance, but it was current talk about the Capital building during the session, and his acts were in accord with such a course.

He was advocating Beck for Speaker and Beck was elected on a Populist ticket. He was asked by Attorney General Beatty why he supported a Populist for Speaker, and he replied that he himself was a Populist and a Doughty man.

"But" said Beatty "you ran in Eureka on the Silver ticket."

"Oh yes!" was the reply. "but you know that a man in Eureka could not have been elected on any other ticket."

This is the whole thing in a nut shell. Allen got into office by sailing under false colors in Eureka, and after the election declared himself a Populist and Doughty man. Had he so declared before election does any one suppose he would have been elected in Eureka.

The Strikers Case.

It is more than probable that the case against Mayne and Cassidy the two railroad strikers whose trial before Judge Morrow has cost the Government \$22,000, will be dismissed. United States District Attorney Foote said to an Examiner reporter recently:

"I will not make any decision for a week or ten days as there are many points to be taken into consideration. If I conclude to dismiss Mayne and Cassidy the 130 other indictments will also be dismissed. The case against them was a clear one and fairly tried, but the jury would not convict. That is all there is about it, except the manner in which the money was used that the Government paid out for witness fees and expenses. Affidavits were made under the pauper witness clause, and between \$10,000 and \$12,000 were paid, which really went to the support of the army of strikers that has been hanging around the Appraisers Building since the beginning of the trial. One of them came to me not long ago and made the remark that he would like this kind of thing to go on the whole year."

The will of the late Frederick Douglass leaves all his property to his wife and children. There is a prospect that the will will be declared invalid for the reason that there were but two witnesses to the will, whereas the law of the District of Columbia requires three. But in case the will should be declared invalid the law would distribute the Douglass property about as Mr. Douglass himself tried to distribute it. Douglass was not the only man who might have saved himself trouble by letting the law take its course.

A contemporary says that it is a singular fact that silver is more apt to advance when its friends are keeping still than when they are making a fuss about it. There seems to be a

little confusion in this statement respecting the law of cause and effect. When silver is advancing, its friends have no reason to make a fuss about it.—Bulletin.
