

THE MUZZLED EXAMINATION.

There is only one class of legal testimony that ought to be given behind closed doors, and that is when the details are liable to pollute public morals, by reason of their salaciousness.

There is nothing of this kind in the Mint shortage examination, and the attorneys for the defense made a bad move when they insisted on closed doors.

This move, coupled with the attempt to throw the onus of the secret examination on the Government, was a grave blunder, and we believe now that the defense concedes it.

Had they taken William Woodburn into the case earlier this faux pas would never have occurred.

It should also be borne in mind that the money stolen from the Mint belongs to the people of the United States represented by the Government.

The peoples money has been stolen and every citizen has a right to be present at the investigation and know just how it is being conducted.

The defense has insisted on the star chamber proceedings, not the prosecution. The Government attorneys called for the opening of the doors on Thursday, and the public is clamoring for them to swing free.

The present secret proceedings are a farce, for they are not secret nor will they be while the APPEAL can secure the news for its subscribers.

Home Made Flour.
