Senator Jones' Health.

Washington, May 1.—Advices were received here yesterday at the Bimetallie League headquarters from New York to the effect that the health of Senator Jones, of Nevada, does not improve, and that his physician has ordered him to keep absolutely quiet and avoid all excitement whether from business or other affairs. The physician has also ordered that Mrs. Jones, who is absent either in California or elsewhere, should be sent for to care for her husband.

It is understood that Senator Jones suffers from some affection of the heart, and while his condition is by no means dangerous, yet absolute rest is essential to recovery. The fact really is that Senator Jones has never fully recovered from the physical and mental strain of his speech at the special session convened to consider the repeal of the Sherman Silver Purchase Act, which, it will be recalled, occupied over a week in delivery and was attended with immense labor in preparation of facts and data touching the monetary question.

Failed to Agree.

The jury in the Wilde case failed to agree as they regarded the witnesses as blackmailers. When the news of the disagreement reached outside of the court there was great excitement and extra editions of the evening papers were bought up quickly. When Sir Edward Clarke, counsel for Wilde, asked for bail, Justice Charles said the application must be made in the Chambers.

Wilde will be tried again at the next session of the Central Criminal Court. Throughout the proceedings he was very pale.

A British warship has gone to Pescadores Island to bring the Times correspondent who was detained there by the Japanese to prevent the sending of dispatches regarding the massacre which is said to have occurred at the Chinese garrison at that place.

Fair's wheat being thrown on the market is causing a panic in the pit. Fair is also no doubt causing a flurry in the pit on the other side.

What May Be Expected.

An old Spanish proverb says: "Water in May is bread all the year." If this was true of the mountains of Spain, it is certainly so of the mountains of Nevada. The precipitation during this month averages a little over half an inch (.69), the number of days on which rain or snow fell, 5, and the greatest amount in any one day was one inch, May 31, 1891. The greatest monthly amount was 2.61, in 1891, and the least .04, in 1880.

Very high temperatures have been recorded during this month, the highest, 101, on May 30, 1887; the lowest temperature, 22, took place on the 1st of this month in 1887 and 1891. The average temperature, as computed from fifteen Mays is 56; the warmest month was that of 1881 and 1886, with an average of 60, the coldest with an average of 52 in 1893.

May, as a rule is about half sunshine, there being an average of 16 clear, 5 partly cloudy and 10 cloudy days. The prevailing winds have been from the southwest, from which direction the highest velocity occurred, sixty miles an hour on May 10th, three years ago.
