

WHY ARE WE UNDEVELOPED?

During the last few days Mr. Wm. Smythe editor of the Irrigation Age, has been in Carson trying to induce the people of this section to begin the development of the country lying back of Carson.

He finds a magnificent country, splendid climate, unequalled soil and abundance of water. One thing he has not found, however, in very large quantities and that is the enterprise. The citizens of Carson have too much interest in California development to lend a willing ear to Nevada enterprise. Look at the record.

The Bonanza firm made nearly a hundred million in the State. The Capital went to New York, San Francisco, Paris and Milan. About twenty-five million went into a disastrous wheat deal. Had they expended ten per cent of the loss in trying to raise wheat in Nevada instead of the Chicago wheat pit, they would not have lost the money and they would have put thousands of acres of Nevada land under cultivation.

The V. & T. R. R. Company owned by D. O. Mills, sends its surplus earnings to New York. The profits of the road do not go to develop the country through which it runs, but are seen in costly structures in New York and San Francisco.

Most of our leading citizens have their surplus money in canals, ditches or orange lands in California. The writer has always preached State development and practiced it, but he gets called a fool for his pains often more than anything else, and so does every other man who attempts, in no matter how small a way, to develop Nevada.

Now if these people we have mentioned had put one half into Nevada that they have into California, they would have a thriving, growing state to live in. Another matter worthy of notice is the sending away of money to California to purchase supplies. There are about twenty leading families of Carson who have a Wells Fargo frank and they purchase cheaply in San Francisco and ship to Nevada for nothing. These people can hardly be expected to put any money into State development. It matters not to them whether the town has one thousand or ten thousand people living in it.

These are some of the difficulties Mr. Smythe will meet with in trying to develop this section of the country. In yesterday's issue we printed the full address of Mr. Smythe, and printed 1000 extra copies for general distribution as did the other papers of Carson. This address ought to be read by every man and woman in Carson. The opportunity presented us now is one of a life time. We should decide now whether we save Carson from dry rot or put it on its feet. If we do not embrace this opportunity, we never deserve to have another presented us.

The Sheep Law

The Record Union has the following on the proposition to test the validity of the anti-sheep law of Nevada.

It appears that the nomadic shepherds of Nevada propose to test the validity of the Act requiring them to pay a license. Here are a lot of men who produce wool and mutton without owning in any degree the source of these products. And yet they ask the privilege of the free use of the grazing ranges of Nevada, and object to any law which forces them to contribute to the expense of their own protection. If one of these shepherds should receive injury at the hands of any man he appeals to the law, and yet he wants the machinery of that law kept in force and effect without expense to him. The enfeebled moral conviction from which springs this protest against the license law passed by the last Legislature is altogether apparent. It appears to us that a similar law concerning the open ranges of California could have been passed in this State to the advantage of its people.
