

THE WOMAN'S CONGRESS.

During the past week a woman's congress has been in pretty copious blast in San Francisco and the same papers who for years have been making fun of women's gatherings in San Francisco were awed by the power of numbers and enthusiasm and bowed down to it.

Recently in San Francisco Mr. Hearst of the Examiner, asked his composing force to abolish the practice of charging full composition rates on cuts which they only had to lift into the form.

As a result about half the printers who refused to comply with a very reasonable request, will be hunting jobs. Many of the men who declined to come down on the cut question have been furnished employment by Mr. Hearst for years at good wages.

The Typographical Union must now face the machine, and do so in a spirit of self-interest. The Union must adapt itself to the new condition of things, and instead of striving to antagonize the machine, work matters so that the machine in the long run will not work a detriment to the type setting industry.
