

SENATE BILL 91.

On the last session of the Legislature a bill was passed which takes the power of letting printing contracts, entirely out of the hands of the County Commissioners. The APPEAL need not remind the public that for years past the County Commissioners have been gradually reaching for more power until they have arrogated to themselves prerogatives belonging to other offices.

They have assumed to dictate to any county officer who will stand it, where he shall get his supplies and have his printing and advertising done. But the right to dictate what newspaper should do the official printing and advertising has always been dear to the heart of the average County Commissioner. By means of this lever they can close the mouth of newspapers and by thus muzzling the press run county expenditures to suit themselves.

We believe that this power is a dangerous weapon in the hands of unprincipled men and it should be taken from them. Under the new law the County Commissioners can not dictate to the newspapers and as a result the press will be left perfectly free to criticize the acts of a Board and tell the people in what manner their money is being handled.

Two months ago the Recorder of Ormsby county under the new law designated the APPEAL as the official organ. At the May meeting of the County Commissioners should have obeyed the law, which says that after the Recorder has subscribed to a newspaper it shall be declared the official organ of the county. The Commissioners however declined to abide by the law on the grounds that it might not be constitutional. They stood in with the new military law at once because it suited them. They agreed however to leave the matter to the District Attorney, who is the legal advisor of the county. He decided that the law was mandatory and took effect at once. The Commissioners however declined to accept the law which raises a peculiar question. Has a board of County Commissioners the right to object any law that doesn't suit them?

They evidently hold that they can obey or ignore a law as they deem proper just as the Board used to ignore the law relative to County contracts, a law, the validity of which the APPEAL proposes to test in the Courts. In Washoe county the Recorder under the new law designated the Journal as the paper which should be the official organ, but again a Republican board ignored the law and gave the contract to the Gazette. The Journal has taken the matter to the Supreme Court and it will be tested at once. It is not improbable, however, that the Boards of these counties would ignore a Supreme Court decision if they felt so disposed. It will not be long before the matter will be finally decided.

QUEER TACTICS.

The Carson Mint investigation is destined to go down as one of the most infamous farces on record.

The way the officials are shielding all suspected of connection with the Mint shortage, with the exception of Johnny Jones, whom they are unquestionably persecuting, is causing a general murmur of indignation.—Enterprise.

If the organs of the defendant in this case continue in this strain, well may Mr. Jones exclaim: "The Lord save me from my friends."

When the shortage was discovered and supposed to be a Silver party shortage, the Republican papers wanted to see the rasnals all sent to jail at once. When the shortage was located in the Republican party, the idea of a trial at once became something infamous and uncalled for. For months the Republican papers have been showering the Government officials with cheap wit coupled with the wildest misstatements that could be imagined.

The Government meanwhile is going about its business, and proceeding as it always proceeds in criminal cases. The fact that the detectives are not consulting the Republican papers or telling them their intentions may be very reprehensible, but it is a way they have of doing, and their conduct may possibly be excused, on the grounds of force of habit. We think that Mr. Jones' attorneys have done a very vealy thing to attempt to try their case in the newspapers, and a very injudicious thing to get angry because the Government is not conducting its prosecution according to advice given them by the defendant's attorneys.

In due time the trials of all the suspected parties will come off, and when the evidence is all in the sifting

of the guilty from the innocent will be a very simple matter and the Government will not in any way stop to consider the politics of the accused.
