

SILVER IN NEW ENGLAND.

There is no daily newspaper in Maine more able or more prosperous than the Bangor Commercial, whose principal owner, by the way, is Hon. Joseph B. Bass, one of the wealthiest as well as one of the shrewdest business men in his State. It is worthy of special mention that the Commercial indorses the currency views of Hon. Arthur Sewall, the Maine member of the Democratic National Committee, and declares without "if" or "but for the free and independent coinage of silver by the United States.

Other New England newspapers are sure to follow the example of the Bangor Commercial when once their conductors are able to free themselves from the hypnotic influence of the Money Power, which is exercised upon them directly, or through the influence of the local party bosses.

We have already noted the fact that the old Boston Post started out to canvass the sentiment of its readers on the currency issue, but, like grandfather's clock, "stopped short, never to go again," as soon as it saw that the drift of opinion was strongly in favor of free silver. The result when the canvass was abruptly terminated showed a majority of nearly 500 against the gold monometallists and in favor of free coinage of both gold and silver at the present legal ratio, independent of the action of any other nation. And the Post is an anti-silver paper, bound by tradition and circumstances to support the money standard which the great money lenders of England and America demand.

These "straws" show that a breeze is springing up in a new corner, and affords ground for much encouragement to the few Eastern men who were early in the field proclaiming their adhesion to genuine financial reform. There is quite as much joy among the latter over the conversion of one of the heathen worshippers of the gold standard in darkest New England than there is over the steadfastness of all the free silver hosts in the great West and the new South.

There is No Middle Course.

The "spellbinders" who propose to educate Western voters up to the British plan of gold monometallism under the auspices of Secretary Gardner, of the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee, intend, it is stated, to urge upon their hearers a middle-class course. There is no middle course. There is no choice between the restoration of silver to the place provided for it in the Constitution, side by side with gold, or, on the other hand, British gold monometallism, which means serfdom for the American people to the gold monopolists of London and Wall street.

The Livermore Herald says: "The trades unions made a bad break in San Francisco and Oakland by refusing to turn out on the Fourth of July. Labor may have its grievances, but true patriotism should overbalance all differences when the nation's birthday rolls around." The trades unions of Oakland defy passing any such resolution. That of San Francisco still glories in its shame.

General A. J. Warner says a split in the Democratic party on the money question is inevitable. The silver men must therefore get together and select a candidate for President who will be supported by the Silver Democrats and Republicans and the Populists. With such a candidate, victory is certain.

Santa Rosa is coming to the front through the efforts of the ladies. They are planning improvements, all of which will combine beauty with utility, and the women have been so successful thus far that they are putting up signs warning the men to keep off the grass.

Victoria Woodhull's daughter has begun to lecture. She believes that the scarcity of money is one of the greatest causes of immorality and vice. She advocates free coinage as a moral factor in society.

San Francisco has been visited by a fire which swept out \$1,000,000 worth of property. It is only a matter of time when the city will be wiped out by fire on account of the many frame buildings.

The Southern Pacific Company has reduced its freight rates on merchandise going from California points to Utah. A reduction to Nevada points would be an agreeable surprise.
