

THE SILVER COMBINE.

For some time past negotiations have been pending for a complete consolidation of the American Bimetallic League, National Bimetallic Union and the National Silver Committee, the three principal silver organizations in the United States, representing all sections of the country. These negotiations have culminated in an agreement by the representatives of the respective organizations by which such consolidation has been substantially perfected. Nothing now remains to be done but a ratification by the Executive Committee of these organizations, each acting separately, which will speedily follow.

The consolidated organization will be known as the American Bimetallic Union. Its principal office and general headquarters will be in Chicago, in the office occupied by the National Bimetallic Union, with branch offices in Washington, San Francisco and perhaps in other cities both North and South.

It is the purpose of the united organization to press the campaign of education on behalf of bimetallicism with the utmost vigor in all parts of the country.

A conference of pronounced silver men will be held at Washington, January 22, when a plan of action will be outlined, which, it is said, will have an important bearing upon political events of next year.

Free Coinage Bill.

Senator Jones of Arkansas presented an amendment which he proposes to offer to the House Bond bill. It provides that any holder of silver bullion who is a citizen of the United States may tender the same to the Secretary of the Treasury and have it coined into silver dollars, the seignorage to be the difference between the coinage value and the market price of the bullion in New York for the cancellation of all bank notes of less than \$10 and directing the Secretary of the Treasury to coin the silver bullion in the treasury into silver dollars to be used in redeeming the treasury notes issued for the purpose of purchasing silver bullion under the Sherman Act and the redemption of greenbacks in either gold or silver and for their reissue according to the provisions of the Act of 1878.

The New Year.

The Silver State says Stone arrived in Winnemucca Christmas day and canvassed for orders for groceries claiming to represent Stevens Brothers, San Francisco. He marked prices away down and required those who gave him orders to pay cash down. Stone was arrested at Lovelocks. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$300, or imprisonment for 150 days. He had just been released from jail in Elko where he served sixty days for working the same racket.

Now that Brule, a common night watchman, has been convicted at Carson for giving a witness in the Heney trial money, why wouldn't it be a good idea to punish the person or persons who bribed Brule. Surely the Government officials didn't think Brule paid Langevin out of his own pocket.—Silver State.

The Silver State can rest assured that the men Brule got his money from, will be properly attended to in due course of time.

It looked as if all the Piutes in the state were in Wadsworth on Christmas day, says the Dispatch. It has become the custom for the local merchants to treat the Indians, large and small to a Christmas gift of things good to eat and the red men are always on hand for the occasion.

The gold mining exchange of San Francisco was organized Saturday with several prominent men as charter members. Its purpose is to bring owners of mines and prospects into direct contact with capitalists willing to develop mining properties.
