

THE COFFIN CASE.

There is a great deal of impatience and dissatisfaction expressed in this community over the law's delay in dealing with Tremore Coffin.

Much adverse criticism was indulged in at the expense of Chas. Jones the U. S. District Attorney during the past few weeks as the public blamed him for the delay. His action in filing the complaint exonerates him of the charge of lukewarmness or neglect of duty. The case is out of his hands now and the public can feel assured that Judge Hawley, who has never been charged with lack of backbone, will discharge his duty with the fearlessness that has characterized his actions since he went on the United States Bench. The expedition manifested by the Government in dealing with the Beule case need not be taken as a guide in the Coffin case. One was a man ignorant of the law who had formerly borne a good reputation. He was used as a tool innocently and it is not probable that he realized a cent out of his work. It is more than probable that he was threatened with political opposition if he did not do as he was told and these things taken into consideration resulted in a light sentence. Such a case is very readily disposed of. The Coffin case is different. He is an attorney, a man of high standing before the public in the State and he is bound by the obligations of a solemn oath to respect the laws and uphold them.

His use of corruption money in the Heney case was deliberate and his work he knew perfectly well was illegal under the statutes. The case therefore becomes one of considerable gravity, one which in addition to a simplification for contempt, should occupy the attention of the Grand Jury.

It is a case when the Government should proceed with due caution and beware of every step of its ground. These illegal and rascally practices of corruption which has for years almost nullified the power of the courts, need to be stamped out in such a fashion that no one will, for years to come, risk character and liberty by such acts of grave violation of the law of the land.

There should be no mistake in the matter, and no guilty man should escape. The fountain of justice has been poisoned and the man who has polluted the stream should be dealt with the law to the full extent and the results cannot be properly reached by hasty action.

Simply a Character.

The Carson News says its ridiculing of Langevin has no conception with the mini case or anybody's wrong doing and that he is simply a "character." It is strange that the News never discovered that Langevin was a "character" until after he had exposed the bribery in the Heney trial. It is natural to suppose, from the conduct of the News toward Langevin since the trial, that had he remained seared or lied while on the witness stand, he would not be subject to so much ridicule and abuse. He told the truth on the stand and is simply a "character" for the News to ridicule—Independent.

The plan adopted by the defense in the Government cases of trying to laugh the whole thing out of court has been abandoned, they have begun to realize that the affair is no laughing matter.
