NIGHT IN CHINATOWN.

A Cess-pool of Vice and no Official Interference.

Chinatown in this city needs thorough official overhauling. It is at present the stamping ground of lotteries and opium dens and there is no cognizance taken of the matter by the authorities.

The lottery games run in open violation of the law, and there are two drawings a day. White men cannot run a lottery game in Nevada but the Chinese seem to have special privileges not accorded to anyone else.

At night the place is crowded with young boys gambling, drinking and smoking opium, and the officers who are on duty at that hour merely look on and seem to be amused at what is transpiring. Boys crowd about the faro and tan games and the opium dens do a thriving business. The opium dens are dragging many a young man in this city down to certain death. There is but one end of a man who gets in the clutches of the opium vice. He winds up in the asylum or the penitentiary, and at all events becomes a worthless member of the community.

There are city ordinances by which these dens of disease could be closed up, but the officials, whose duty it is to act, do not seem to think the law is made to be enforced.

No More Seeds.

No Female Deputies.

In Attorney-General Beatty's annual report the following appears:

"January 18th advised John Shier County Recorder of Lincoln county, that an appointment by him of a woman as Deputy Recorder would be null and void, for the reason that every public officer, except Superintendent of Public Schools and School Trustees, must be a qualified elector under the State Constitution, eighth amendment, Article XV, Section 3, as ratified February 11, 1889, and that deputies must have the same qualifications as their principals."
