NIXON'S MANIFESTO.

He Publishes Some Extraordinary Sentiments Regarding John P. Jones.

In Monday's issue of the Silver State an entire page in big type is taken up with a statement of what Senator Jones has done in Washington, which Mr. Nixon claims is taken from the pages of the Congressional Record. The following are extracts together with the comments made by Mr. Nixon:

First Session, Fiftieth Congress.
Offered amendment twice.
Appointed conferee twice.
Bills introduced.
1. For relief of Nevada; 2; Motion to adjourn. Remarks on silver; Indian depredations.

Second Session, Fiftieth Congress.
Absolutely nothing done; evidently not in attendance.

Second Session, Fifty-Third Congress.
Not heard of.

Nothing said or done.

There is the record of eight years, nine sessions, of Congress.
Recapitulation.

Attendance, hardly one-third of the time.

Amendments offered, 2.
Appointed conferee, 2.

Bills introduced, 3.
Remarks made, 4 times.

Motion to adjourn, 2.
Petitions presented, 1.

Forty-four ayes and nays votes show that Jones voted 4 times and was absent 40 times.

So much for his record in the Senate.

No record can be found of property assessed to him in Nevada, but the following list, taken from the Assessor's books of Los Angeles county, Cal., tells quite a different, viz:

J. P. Jones—Assessed value 1895 and 1896. Three fourths interest in 32,419 acres of land in Los Angeles county. Assessed value, \$450,030, making a tax of \$5972 53.

He is virtually the owner of the North Beach Bath House. Assessed value, \$20,500. Tax, \$338.

Santa Monica Water Company. Assessed value, \$22,000. Tax \$312 28. Santa Monica Imp. Co. Assessed value \$2,600. All of 24 acres in Santa Monica Corporation and a greater part of the entire town of Santa Monica.

His acreage is in the Rio San Vicente, adjoining Santa Monica some 30,259 acres. Rio Boca de Santa Monica contains some 2160 acres. This is in Santa Monica canyon and up the coast close to the new wharf.
