Of Interest to Publishers.

The APPEAL has made an arrangement with Detective Stillwell on behalf of the Nevada Newspaper Association to keep the press of this State posted on the advertising dead beats who swindle newspapers. Here is his report on the Columbia Medical Institute, which has from time to time advertised in the Nevada newspapers:

The Columbia Medical Institute was up to quite recently located at 1,007 Market Street, San Francisco, and is composed of one Chas. K. Holsman, M. D., and a small boy. Dr. Holsman is the Institute when at home and one of the traveling physicians of the Columbia when abroad. During his trips into the interior he patronizes the local papers of whatever town he happens to visit and has the bills sent to his home address, where they remain unpaid. To collectors the Doctor says at first that he would lay the matter before his brother, who he claims is the man who contracted for the ads, but after several calls made on him he drops the brother and admits that he has no money and is unable to meet the bills. As a matter of fact, he has no brother home at all his only brother being an architect residing in Milwaukee. Men who have been intimately acquainted with Dr. Holsman for years say his reputation is an unsavory one. A few days ago, about the first of February, the Columbia Medical Institute, that is the Doctor and his small boy, were busy packing their belongings, they being in financial trouble, as Dr. Holsman frankly stated. He did not know then whether he would only move to some other locality or whether he would abolish the Institute altogether.
