S. B. 47, by Livingston, authorizing State Board of Regents to advertise for bids to furnish table football at the State University—Judiciary.

S. B. 75, by Hjul, to repeal present act relating to County Auditors' expenses, etc.—Judiciary.

S. B. 76, by Comins, authorizing special election to amend State constitution—Judiciary.

S. J. R. 13, by Ernst, concerning the free and unlimited coinage of Silver at the ratio of 16 to 1, independent of all other nations—Federal relations.

A. B. 112, by Kirman, paying deficiency of traveling expenses of District Judge—Judiciary.

A. B. 108, providing for Court Stenographer—Judiciary.

S. B. 118, by Dooley, Relief of Dr. S. L. Lee—Committee of the Whole.

A. B. 106, by Van Eiten, relief of Savage and Bain—Committee of the Whole.  
S. J. 4, by Ernst, election of U. S. Senator by the direct vote of the people—Constitution Committee appointed.

McGowan moved to reconsider the vote by which the lottery bill was defeated—carried.

A. B. 130, an Act in relation to the advertising for State supplies for stationery—Public Printing.

A. B. 131, an act the better to preserve court records and prescribing penalties for infringement—Judiciary.

By Coryell, 132, an Act fixing the salaries of certain county officers in Elko county—Elko delegation.

By Coryell, an Act to repeal section 3 of an Act fixing salaries and compensation of the officers of Elko county and consolidating certain offices therein.

By Strosmider, 134, amendatory of an Act for the purchase and preservation of public newspapers printed and published in the several counties of this State and to provide for all printing and publication required by law—Public Printing.

By Van Eiten, 135, an Act directing the submission of certain questions to the electors of Carson City at the election to be held for Trustees of Carson City on the first Monday in May, 1899—Ormsby delegation.

By Patterson, 23, an Act to regulate the settlement of estates of deceased persons—passed 27 to 1.

By Van Eiten, 141, to aid and benefit Agricultural District No. 1—Committee of Whole.

By McGowan, 126, to amend certain sections of an Act relating to elections—passed.

S. B. 18 by Flanigan, an act to regulate proceedings in civil cases in the courts of justice—lost 9 to 18.

S. B. 56, granting leave of absence to Attorney-General Jones—passed.

A. B. 94 by McGowan, relief G. W. Cowing—lost, 14 to 11.

A. B. 126 by Coryell, authorizing Secretary of State to furnish certain books—passed.

S. C. R. 11, amending State constitution placed at bottom of file.

S. B. 64, by Comins, preservation of State specimens—passed.

A. B. 114, by Meacham, amending Sec. 36 of elections law—passed.

**EVENING SESSION.**

The evening session was occupied by the discussion of the Woman's Suffrage Bill. The measure was defeated by a vote of 15 to 11.
