

THE TICKET NAMED.

Sparks For Governor Van Duzer For Congress

A BIG RATIFICATION IN RENO LAST NIGHT

Yesterday wound up the Fusion conventions as far as the nominations are concerned. That the meeting will live as one of the hottest contested battles in Nevada politics, there is no doubt. The length of time taken by the members began to weary the on-lookers, and those who lived outside of the scene were beginning to believe that the boys would keep at the work until election day.

This is all over and the ticket is named.

The delay was caused by the Conference Committee, that took more than the usual amount of time, and it is understood that it took a heap of talking to adjust the affairs of two parties in one room.

The town of Carson was at sea most of the day. Johnny Hill, at the Arlington, kindly kept his grapevine telephone line in operation, and the boys received information of all kinds. First they nominated a man and then they didn't, and by the time the wires were down the whole ticket was thrown over the fence and a new one in formation.

The Conference Committee.

The Conference Committee seemed to have the fate of the nominees in hand and as they failed to report, or the report failed to be ratified, there seemed to be doubt in the minds of many that the convention would get down to nominating before another day. The following was the division of offices as decided upon by the committee:

Committee on Conference: To the Democrats—Governor, Congressman, Attorney-General, Long term regent, and Superintendent of Public Instruction. The other offices fall to the Silver Party, and are Lieutenant Governor, Justice of the Supreme Court, Secretary of State, Treasurer, Controller, Surveyor-General, State Printer and Short term Regent.

The respective delegations will then nominate five district judges. According to the report of the committee on Permanent Organization and Order of Business, the candidates are to be assessed for campaign purposes in sums ranging from \$20 to \$50.

The Ticket.

RENO, Nev., August 28.—The work of nominating the ticket is progressing. While there is a number of hot fights on the floor, those who are receiving the nominations are being chosen by a big margin. Nearly all of the other candidates are watching the Howell-Roff fight, as it still seems to be anybody's fight. The two men have mustered all of their strength and it is looked for a close vote when the roll is called.

RENO, Nev., Aug. 28, 6 p.m.—The nominations for the Fusion ticket have been completed. The fight between Howell and Roff has resulted in a victory for Howell, he winning by a vote of 74 to 56. There was some lively scrimmages over the fight, but the Howell forces have won the day.

ANOTHER STRIKE

MORE RICH ORE FOUND IN TONOPAH

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
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
