### Fusion Should Win the Senatorial Fight

Under the heading "The Nevada Senatorship," last Thursday's Examiner contains the following editorial:

From a national point of view the most important feature of the political situation in Nevada is the candidacy of Representative Newlands for the United States Senatorship. Nevada occupies the very unique position of being a strong anti-Republican State represented by two Republican Senators, neither of whom was elected by the Republican party. The term of Senator Jones expires on the fourth day of next March. Mr. Newlands is an avowed candidate for the position, and the indications are that he will be successful.

The political forces opposed to the Republican party are divided into two organizations—the Democratic and Silver parties. Although these organizations are distinct, they are agreed on everything affecting Nevada's interests, while on national questions there is much in common between them. Complete fusion is the program, and both have strongly endorsed Mr. Newlands for the Senate. At the last election their combined strength was greatly in excess of the Republican, and with perfect harmony there is no reason to doubt that they will carry the State.

The election of Mr. Newlands will be gratifying from a Democratic point of view, but beyond that it should be highly satisfactory to the Pacific and Intermountain States generally, aside from mere partisan considerations. His record in the House of Representatives has been an enviable one. His standing at all times has been excellent, and as a member of the Committees on Foreign Affairs, Banking and Currency, and Ways and Means he has made a reputation broadly national in character. He was a strong factor in the legislation which led to the annexation of Hawaii; he has been active and prominent in all measures relating to Cuba, opposing the Republican plan of reciprocity, but favoring the annexation of the island; he is of course, in full sympathy with his people upon the money question, and he rendered most effective aid in securing the enactment of the irrigation law from which the arid west hopes to realize far-reaching benefits.

Mr. Newlands has been indefatigable in his efforts in behalf of his State, and having served faithfully for nearly ten years in the lower house, it would seem as if he had fairly earned a promotion to the Senate. Thus it appears to outsiders who are familiar with his career, and such, evidently is the view of the conventions of the two parties which together are believed to constitute the dominant political force in the Sagebrush State.

## HOME MERCHANTS

PATRONIZE THEM AND HELP YOUR TOWN

### The Catalogue Season is Again Ripe

Twice a year this city along with the rest in the State is flooded with circulars and catalogues from the different houses on this coast and even the eastern States get in their work. The men as well as the women patronize these foreign stores to more or less extent, and it is a well known fact that thousands of dollars go out of this city every year for goods that could have been bought for practically the same sum from the home merchant.

The goods bought from foreign houses are not confined to fancies, but even groceries and hardware come from the houses out of the State. Some people have furnished their houses with furniture from catalogues that they could have received from the home trader at the same figures, and given the man that is paying taxes in this city a chance to make a commission. The merchants are the real life of a community. It is their trading that builds up a town and puts it on the financial map. Without the support of the people in their own town, the merchant orders less goods or else fails, in which case the town receives a black eye from which it takes a long time to recover.

When a party receives a catalogue and is contemplating sending out of town for goods they should first consult the home merchant. In nine cases out of ten, the goods will be duplicated at the catalogue price, and often the customer receives the benefit of the freight, as the merchant often receives his goods at carload rates, which is less than half what the individual purchaser pays. The trouble is that most people believe that they are receiving their goods at a less figure. Suppose they do; hasn't the home merchant got to live. If they are to remain residents, they must do business, and with the cash that is sent away, you have cheated the townsman of a sum that is his by right of business in your city, where he pays taxes and license.

The extent of the catalogue business in this city is amazing. All one has to do is to take a look at the freight that is delivered, and it will surprise the home people. At the money order departments there is a regular banking business done, with all kinds of orders for goods that can be furnished in this city. Could all the cash that is sent away every year be spent here, the merchants would place a stock of goods in their stores that would equal anything on the coast, and it can be done by the people themselves.

There should be a club formed in this city to further the cause. The women as well as the men should take a hand in it, and by a year's work they will help themselves as much as the merchants, and this city will rank about first in the commercial world of the State.

### The Tracy Reward

The dispute over the reward of the \$4,100 is about to be settled without the intervention of the courts. Sheriff Gardner has notified the five Creston men that if they would agree to share the reward with Goldfinch, who gave the information that led to the capture of the fugitive, he would withdraw his objections to the payment of the money and aid the Creston posse to secure it. It is probable that the five men will agree to give Goldfinch a share of the reward, in which case it will be promptly paid as Gardner is the only claimant besides the Creston men and young Goldfinch.

## THE RENO SHOOTING

RESULT OF THE GUN FIGHT THURSDAY

### One Man Dead and the Other Dying

The shooting that occurred in the New Tivoli saloon Thursday evening has already resulted in one death. The other victim cannot live. At a late hour last night he was seized with cramps, and the physicians give no hope for his recovery or living even through the night.

Ed Broderick succumbed to his bullet wounds about five o'clock yesterday morning. He died at the county hospital. His injuries were not thought to be as serious as those of Frank Ralston, but an examination after death revealed a jagged hole through which the bullet passed to his hip.

Mr. Ralston was unconscious nearly ever since he received his wounds and he has been unable to give out a connected account of the tragedy. The death of Broderick doubtless does away with the legal proceedings except the inquest. He has been placed under arrest immediately after the shooting.

Later—Dr. Woods, Gibson and Lewis, who are attending Frank Ralston, reported him 2:30 this morning to be somewhat better. His mother will arrive tomorrow.—Journal.

### Be Sportsmen

Monday the game law opens for the duck season, and from the preparations, half the town will be on the trail. While there are plenty of birds this season that are able to fly, yet there are many that are classed as "flippers," or young birds, that cannot yet use their wings. It is the custom of some unsportsmanlike hunters to kill everything that shows up and in doing this many of these useless and unprotected ducks are killed. They are not fit to eat, and anyone that will fully kills them should not be classed with the sports. It is said that a number of boys killed several dozen of these birds up the river yesterday. If it can be proven, they should pay the penalty. The members of the gun clubs should see that the small birds are protected, and if the boys are going out they should be instructed to kill only such birds as can fly. There are enough of the big birds without killing these useless and half-bred birds.
