**MR HAY'S PROTEST**

SECRETARY HAY'S protest against the dumping of pauper Jewish immigrants from Roumania into the United States may or may not have the desired effect. Certainly it was time such action was taken. A reading of the secretary's message to our ambassadors resident in the capitals of the countries that were parties to the treaty of Berlin in 1873 gives some startling information about the treatment to which Jews are subjected in Roumania.

Conditions there are absolutely intolerable. Jews are discriminated against in every conceivable way. They are not permitted to own land, they may not reside in the rural districts, and many branches of trade and manual labor are closed to them. In those that are open many galling restrictions are imposed, one most objectionable being a law requiring employers to hire at least two Roumanians to every "unprotected alien," or Jew.

The natural result of these conditions is and has been to drive the Roumanians Jews to an asylum in this country. They come here absolutely unfit to become citizens. Few of them know how to read or write their own language; they have no money with which to support themselves until they become accustomed to their new surroundings. Inevitably, therefore, they become charges upon the United States for an indefinite time.

The Roumanian Jews are not the only undesirable immigrants who find easy access to American shores. It is a matter of record that the fierce foreign element among the anthracite coal miners is directly responsible for nearly, if not quite, all of the lawlessness that has been manifested in Pennsylvania since the strike began. They are people who will never make and who never intended to make good citizens.

But Secretary Hay cannot stop undesirable immigration with a simple protest to European powers. He knows that as well as anybody else. They may heed his protest or they may not. That is a matter for the individual powers to determine as they see fit. The United States will have no *casus belli* against any of them if no attention whatever is paid to the secretary's note.

The proper way to reach the immigration question, and the only proper way, is, as the Democrats suggest, by more stringent immigration laws. No constitutional amendment is necessary to bring this about. This republic has the power to exclude any immigrants it may desire, and it cannot make a better beginning than by insisting, first, on a reasonable educational test, and second that every immigrant shall show himself able to support himself from the time he lands.

THE Republican elephant is in considerable danger these days. With the rollicking Mason rocking the boat in Illinois, the Iowa contingent loading him down with demands for tariff revision, in Wisconsin, La Follette and Spooner with knives out for each others' scalps, with one faction shouting for Cuban reciprocity and tariff revision and the trusts demanding protection, in Pennsylvania with Quay fighting Governor Stone and Elkins with Babcock, the chairman of the Republican Congressional Committee, on both sides of the tariff question, prodding the bewildered animal to keep in line, the spectators are wondering what will happen when the circus performance begins.

HOW the wire trust affects the people of Nevada is tersely told by W. H. Gilmer, one of Elko county's solid ranchers, who says the year before the trust was formed he sold his steers for \$35 a head and it took two of them to pay for a ton of barbed wire. This year after the trust was formed he sold his steers for \$32.50 a head and it took four of them to pay for a ton of barbed wire. Mark Hanna once said a trust was a good thing for the people, but Mark would have considerable trouble in convincing Mr. Gilmer that the wire trust is a good thing for the Nevada rancher.
