THE PRESIDENT'S TRIP.

President Roosevelt will reach Louisville, Ky., this morning for a brief visit en route to San Antonio, where he goes for the reunion of the Rough Riders regiment, and his trip will be followed with more than common interest because of his attitude toward the south in the matter of federal appointments.

In the last campaign and even earlier, the southerners expressed themselves very freely on what the assumed was Roosevelt's hostility to them. The Crum appointment and the Booker Washington episode had made a profound impression in Dixie land particularly as they were construed to imply social recognition of the negro as well as a wish to saddle upon an unwilling people federal officials who were obnoxious.

Since that time the feeling has been modified somewhat and curiously enough, the appointment of a negro as a custom official in New York has been one of the reasons for this change of sentiment.

Whether the President's itinerary has been arranged so Roosevelt may conciliate public opinion south of the Ohio will develop on his first public utterance. He has always claimed to be friendly to the south and laid much stress on the fact that he is of the south quite as much as he is of the north in his lineage. Certainly, if he seeks conciliation, he could find no better place and no better opportunity for his plan than Louisville, where sentiment is ultra-southern, although its population is a border division of the north and South. No more hospitable people could be found, none more loyal to their obligations as hosts, none more frank to give expression to likes and dislikes, and none more ready to meet advances in a friendly spirit.

The President will have a good time whether he means to or not; and it is reasonable to suppose that he means to enjoy himself all along the line. If he were not so apt to break out in unexpected places, it would be safe to say that he is carrying the dove of peace under his arm and an olive branch in each hand for the special benefit of everybody south of the Mason and Dixon's line.—Salt Lake Herald.
