For those things the management is not to be blamed.

In the instance of "Cousin Kate" though, the course of the company and the various dates it has played are as easily followed as Main street and a personal guarantee on the part of the management is a thing to be accepted in the best faith in the world, for, not only does the management know its worthiness, but also all the people of this city who are admirers of things high class in theatricals, are fully acquainted with its worth.

STRIKE AT SILVER BOW

Southern Camp Rapidly Coming to the front.

GOLDFIELD, Jan. 25.—Silver Bow comes again to the front with the report of another strike that promises to create considerable excitement. The fortunate discoverers are working a claim 350 feet east of the famous Reed & Robbe leasing shaft.

Some time ago they started a shaft alongside of their ledge which descended vertically into the bowels of the earth. Previous to their beginning sinking they uncovered the vein in the surface and found it to be fully twelve feet wide.

When a depth of fifty feet was attained last Wednesday they began crosscutting and reports today state that they are six feet into the ledge without any sign of the hanging wall. The ore is of a white sugar quartz variety and all of it is said to pan free gold.

Those who are interested in the district are all of the opinion that Silver Bow will in time make a large and permanent mining camp. The drawback that is now undergoing is said to have been caused by many of the original locators having for a long time held their property for too high in price, so that outsiders did not dare to approach their figures.

INCORPORATION FILED

Company Will go into Masonic in the Spring.

That the Masonic District is attracting much attention was evidenced yesterday when incorporation papers were filed by the Masonic Mountain Gold Mining Company with the Secretary of State.

Senator Wils Brougher, is president, J. T. Shaw, secretary and treasurer, John H. Gies, vice president, and Samuel Platt, general counsel.

These together with James Howard of this city, make up the board of directors. The company is capitalized for 1,000,000 shares and a limited amount of treasury stock will be placed on the market at ten cents per share. Considerable of the treasury stock has already been subscribed for, as the well-known value of the property has already stimulated investors.

The company have a five foot ledge on their property and this body of ore has been traced for a distance of 1000 feet. Several applications for leases have been made but they have not been given as the company intends developing their own property.

A rush to this new camp in the Spring is assured as the whole district is known to be highly mineralized. Some of the principal claims in the district are owned by Carson people, who intend to thoroughly develop their properties in the Spring.
