

REINHOLD SADLER DEAD.

Former Governor Passes Away at His Home in Eureka.

Thus the news of the death of Nevada's former governor and one of the best known residents of the State was received in this city and it cast a gloom everywhere it was known. Governor Sadler, was confined to his bed but a short time and during the past two days very encouraging reports had come from his bedside, and the word received yesterday came as a shock to his many friends in this community and over the entire State where he was widely known and highly esteemed for his many worthy traits of character.

Reinhold Sadler, was a native of Russian-Poland, and was 59 years of age. He came to this country when a boy and while still in his youth located in Virginia City where, he and his brother conducted a mercantile establishment. After a successful business career in that city he removed to Austin and later to Eureka where he conducted a prosperous business for many years, retiring when he entered the political field.

Governor Sadler took an active part in the politics of his county and State and was repeatedly given the votes of the people. In 1894 he was elected Lieutenant Governor and upon the death of the governor, John E. Jones, took the reins of office as acting Governor. At the end of the term he received the nomination of the Silver Party and was returned to the office as Governor of the State. His record in that office stands for itself and never a word was uttered assailing his honor in any of his official acts.

At the close of his term of office in 1902, he retired to private life and resumed the management of his extensive interests in the Eastern part of the State and while so engaged was stricken with pneumonia which disease resulted in his death. In the death of Reinhold Sadler, the State loses one of its staunchest citizens and supporters, a man who never forgot the obligations he owed to his country and his constituents and one who was ever willing to lend his energies and wealth to any cause that was worthy.

His home life was one of content and happiness and he leaves an estimable wife, a daughter, just budding into womanhood, three sons, the youngest a boy of about thirteen years to mourn the loss of an affectionate husband and a kind and ever indulgent father. The sympathy of the entire State is extended to these bereaved ones in their hour of trial and sorrow.

Governor Sadler, was a prominent member of the Mason and Odd Fellow Lodges and the funeral will take place in this city on next Thursday under the auspices of these orders.

PAPERS FILED

First Suit Over Manhattan Property Before the Courts

GOLDFIELD, Nevada, Jan. 29.—A sensational lawsuit was brought in Tonopah yesterday, in which James H. Sim, a pioneer resident of the camp is plaintiff and E. E. Saylor, J. E. Humphrey, F. G. Humphrey, C. A. Cooper and G. E. Maute are defendants. The papers were filed with County Clerk Bevis by C. H. McIntosh, who is attorney for plaintiff Sim.

The suit is brought by Sim to recover a one-half interest in and to certain mining claims in Manhattan, the townsites of Manhattan, South Manhattan, and the Buvo, New Erie and Golden Hill additions to the town of South Manhattan, and numerous other claims included among them the principle claims of the camp.

The plaintiff alleges that he was offered a one-half interest in all claims located in return for which he was to have the assaying done at his expense. He claims that he lived up to this contract and spent considerable money. Nothing of any value was found until the strike was made at what is now Manhattan last April.

He asks the court for a restraining order to keep the present claimants from disposing of the property and prays for a judgment granting him his one-half interest.

BLOODY FIGHT AT MINING CAMP.

Union Men Wounded in Battle With Murderous Scabs

GOLDFIELD, Jan. 29.—In a pitched battle between non-union miners and a committee of the Tonopah Miners' Union this afternoon at Cliffords, the scene of a new strike, forty-five miles east of Tonopah, Jack Gineau, a union man, was shot through the lungs and killed and George Cole, a member of the Legislature was shot through the arm.

The murderers, after the shooting, defied a posse of citizens and it was not until the sheriff arrived with a posse of gun fighters that they gave themselves up. Excitement is at fever heat and the non-union miners were brought to this city this evening under the escort of a strong guard. They were taken from Clifford just in time to prevent lynching. At Tonopah wild rumors are afloat of a plan to lynch the prisoners, but they are under a strong guard of a number of deputy sheriffs.

Boy's Leg and Hand Crushed.

Frank McKenzie was seriously injured in Gold Hill Saturday afternoon. He was pushing an empty mine car on the Yellow Jacket mine waste dump track and in attempting to board the car to ride down the track grade his right leg was caught in the wheel causing a compound fracture below the knee joint and his right hand was badly crushed by the car wheels passing over it. The injured boy is aged fifteen years and members of the family residing in Tonopah have been sent for and it is feared the leg must be amputated. The boy was taken to San Francisco last evening for treatment in the hope that his leg may be saved.
