SUSPICIOUS MODESTY

In explaining that the rate bill contains no provisions for the regulations of express companies, Mr. Hepburn stated that the committee declined to insert a provision for their regulation because it wished to have a bill conform with the recommendations of the president. The president in his various recommendations has ignored express companies and therefore the committee thought it advisable to exclude a provision for their regulation.

Mr. Hepburn's explanation is open at least to two constructions. Either the house of representatives has abdicated its legislative functions or else the authors of the measure desire to place upon the executive sole responsibility for it that, in event it shall fail to meet the people's expectations, they may plead that they did exactly what the president told them to do and that if any one is to be blamed it should be placed upon President Roosevelt. It is quite possible that the Republican leaders in the senate may pursue the same course and accept the bill passed by the house without making material change.

The president has not been elected to enact laws. His functions are not legislative. Yet the house with suspicious particularity, has emphasized the fact that it passed a bill to conform exactly with the president's wishes. And in so doing it has ignored one of the most odious transportation monopolies—the express companies. Obviously there is method in the madness of the Republican leaders in the house. They have given Mr. Roosevelt exactly what he has demanded and they insist that he shall have it without the crossing of another t. or the dotting of another i. Why this self-sacrifice? Why this modest denial of responsibility? —Journal.

Will Ask for Daily Mail

Residents of Silver City and Dayton are considering the proposition of applying for a daily mail. At present they receive mail only six days a week, when the population of the two towns should entitle them to a daily service. The government only pays about one dollar a day to the mail contractor, and the additional cost would not be heavy. Citizens of the two town will circulate a petition in a few days, and no doubt the postmaster general will grant the request. —Enterprise.
