He made it pay millions upon millions of dollars to the heirs of policy-holders and to the policy-holders themselves. McCall showed the country the necessity of life insurance an education of which the country stood in need. So much that unkind will be said of him that these truths should be put down now.—Salt Lake Herald.
