A few days ago the Republican press of the State published articles to the effect that United States Senator Francis G. Newlands had purchased the Donner Lake property for \$15,000 and that he is now engaged in attempting to force his holdings upon the Government for \$100,000 or more, if possible. The Journal yesterday telegraphed Senator Newlands for a true statement regarding the question and received the following signed telegraphic reply:

"WASHINGTON, D. C., March 28.—The statement published in the Nevada Republican press that I paid \$15,000 for the Donner Lake property and am now trying to hold up the Government for \$100,000 when the property is needed for irrigation and storage is absolutely false. The Donner Lake property is held by the Occidental Company in which I have a twelfth interest. It is and always has been willing to turn the property over to the Government at cost and interest. The property I acquired for the development of Reno and the State and to keep it out of the hands of speculators. I acted on this principle when I sold the reservoir site of the Truckee-Carson project at a price practically fixed by the Government itself, and when I sold the post office site for less than one-half of its market value. The Company will do the same with Donner Lake and the properties connected therewith if the Government moves within a reasonable time. It would be unreasonable to expect that it will hold forever with an understanding which binds only one party. I have had no negotiations with the government regarding this property and no of none pending. The property is in charge of my Nephew, James Newlands, Jr., who is a director of the company. It is time to put a stop to these shameful lies of which the Republican press has been so prolific regarding the good faith and integrity of a public servant, whose every thought and act has been in harmony with Nevada's best development and prosperity.
