CORRECT

An editorial in the San Francisco Chronicle the other day was highly eulogistic of the Western Union Telegraph Company and concluded:

The service given by this organization is so efficient that very little talk is heard in this country of government ownership of telegraphs. When anyone is found indulging in such advocacy a little inquiry usually develops that he has little familiarity with the subject and still less comprehension of the possibilities of efficient service which government ownership and operation holds out.

The Chronicle man can certainly have no knowledge upon the subject upon which he writes or else the Chronicle itself wishes to boom the Western Union for commercial reasons.

In this section of California the shameful inefficiency, the slipshod methods, the utterly unreliable, untrustworthy and slow-freight service only too frequently furnished by this same Western Union Telegraph company—these furnish the strongest daylight argument in favor of government ownership and operation of telegraph lines.—Sacramento Bee.
