

Will House Homeless

Seventy-five Refugees to be Cared for by Carson's People.

Word was received from Governor Pardee yesterday asking as to what Carson could do in the way of taking care of a number of refugees and homeless of San Francisco. A committee appointed by chairman Davis canvassed the situation and Secretary Roberts telegraphed that this city would find room for seventy-five people, and under this plan arrangements have been made.

The Immigration committee in charge of the reception and accommodation of the 75 sufferers or more from the earthquake who may arrive tomorrow have secured Armory Hall for temporary use.

Fred Cushing will have charge of the work of adapting the hall for their reception and will find employment

for a number of willing hands at any time after 7 o'clock this morning.

Considerable excavating and similar heavy work in addition to carpentering etc., will be necessary to transform the hall into living and sleeping quarters for the homeless ones. Bring along your muscle and Fred will supply the picks and shovels, etc.

Beds for the Homeless

The Relief Committee need all the cots and bedding that can be loaned or donated by the citizens in order to accommodate the refugees of the San Francisco disaster who may arrive tomorrow.

Anyone desiring to contribute should report to the committee at once.

BAKERY DESTROYED

Richardson's Furnace Explodes and Wrecks Interior

Yesterday afternoon the furnace in Richardson's bakery exploded and for a time the entire building was threatened. As it is the furnace is ruined and the bakery will have to be shut down pending the building of a new one.

It is the general belief that the continued heating of the oven in order to help relief work for California caused it to become overheated and, forming a gas, exploded. The entire oven was wrecked.

Mr. Richardson was among the heaviest donors to the California cause having donated his oven to baking and nearly a ton of bread was turned out. The bread was saved and was shipped last evening.

The prompt action of the fire department saved the building and the loss is estimated at between \$750 and \$1,000. The bakery department will be immediately rebuilt.

Mines Close Down

The mines in Virginia City will run with light force on account of the fire and destruction of San Francisco. Pumping will be continued, but no deep work will be attempted until the stock board is righted.

The following dispatch from Cashier Morgan of the Bank of California was received in this city yesterday.

"One hundred miners more or less have been laid off in development work in the tunnel has ceased.

"I think the layoff is temporary, at least it is so given out by the superintendents of the mines. The cause is the catastrophe in San Francisco where the shafts in the mines are principally held. It will be impossible to levy and collect any more assessments until San Francisco gets settled.

Eagles to Raise \$75,000

Food For Distressed

Carson City Sends a Carload of Necessities to the Sufferers

Relief Work

Carson City yesterday started her relief work in a manner that is a pride to all and with a spirit of giving that shows that this city is generous & nothing more.

Nearly every housewife in this city donated articles or baked and cooked for the sufferers. The result of the days work was a carload of provisions and clothing that was forwarded to General Funston who will take care of the distribution.

Everything from bread, there being nearly two tons of this, to sandwiches was given. All day long people filed up to the depot where the cars were loaded. Part of the car was filled with spuds and cooked meats. The spuds will be shipped in a few days by the carload. At the present time three cars of potatoes have been secured which will go forward. Senator Dangberg of Douglas county and his neighbors have donated a carload of potatoes, while the creamery will send a car of butter.

By placing the material in the

hands of General Funston they will be forwarded to the places most needed. Not alone is San Francisco in want but a score of other towns are in dire distress. Such cases will be taken in charge by the army people who are acting in cooperation with Governor Pardee who is endeavoring to see that each and every stricken district receives its share of the donations from the thousands of people who wish to lend assistance. Such articles as ham, flour, butter and potatoes will be distributed as wanted, as the food question is going to last for some period, or until such time as the work begins in the distressed sections. When work commences and wages are being paid the real want will have passed.

Among the articles shipped from Carson yesterday was 250 pounds of coffee and 400 pounds of tea. Sugar could not be supplied as the city already is restricted on this article. Other cars will follow as the people donate. The committee will keep the people advised as to the general wants.

Returned from the Wreckage

Yesterday Mrs. J. Wright and Miss Pearl Cowing, who have giving their relatives unfold worry, they being in San Francisco at the time of the quake and fire, returned to this city. The two ladies were driven from their lodgings twice and finally managed to get through to this city. They report a terrible condition reigning in the stricken city and Oakland and other nearby towns overcrowded with the people who have been rendered homeless.

Safe and Sound

Seventy-five miles of the Toano and Ely railroad are completed. The distance between the two points is forty miles.

The Extension

Between sixty and seventy men are employed laying track on the valley road. The camp at present is in the local yards and the men are brought in every evening where they take their meals and are housed. In a few days the camp will be moved to the river or near the Indian school.

The work of laying rails is going along steadily and in a few days the track will be far enough out so that it will be quite a journey to the end of the road. The construction train is kept moving most of the day.

John Nulty who has been head brakeman on the V. & T. local for the past two years has been removed to this city where he is acting as switchman in the yard.

The weather indications point to another rain. There is dust enough to warrant it.

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
