Its method of criticism was to lead people to infer that the State officials were shirking their obligations to the sufferers in that great calamity.

Now the State Press has taken the matter up and are republishing these statements.

The simple facts are that the Committee on relief subscriptions called first at the Capitol building and not a single person refused to contribute. All the State officials were not present at the meeting but they were amply represented by the subscriptions which amounted to \$330.

**Sounds Like Bryan**

President Roosevelt's message to Congress concerning the famous decision of United States District Judge Humphrey of Chicago, in the case against the members of the Beef Trust has aroused much applause and wonder.

It will be remembered that Judge Humphrey decided that the packers could not be indicted because they had told all their criminal secrets to Mr. Garfield. By confessing to him under pressure, they had received what has become known as an immunity bath, and subsequent proceedings in the courts need interest them no more.

The President takes sharp issue with the Judge. We have said that in so doing he has awakened both applause and wonder.

Applause, because it is intolerable that a United States law directed against monopoly, enacted at the demand of the people, should be set aside by a legal quibble appealing to the momentary whim of a judge. The President will merit and get the approbation of the people for his protest.

Wonder, because not so long ago to criticize a court was declared something akin to anarchy. Now the President of the United States himself dares describe Judge Humphrey's decision as a "miscarriage of justice," making the "will of Congress

absolutely abortive."

These be strong words to say of the decision of a Federal Judge. A few years since if spoken by a campaign orator they would have been variously denounced as anarchistic or revolutionary. Now they are spoken by the President and applauded by the people.
