New Court Ruling May Shut Out Non-Residents

In the District Court at Reno a number of divorce cases in which the defendants are non-residents upon whom service was not obtained, are being held under consideration pending a thorough investigation of the United States Supreme Court decision in the celebrated New York Connecticut case. If the Nevada District Courts hold that divorces should not be granted here which other States are not bound to recognize, it will have the effect of preventing hundreds of Californians from coming to Nevada to gain freedom from galling marital bonds. Among the causes which the District Court is holding under advisement are those of Dr. Pedar Sather Bruguiere and Madame Seminario of San Francisco, both of whom are prominent society people the former a physician and the latter a singer of note.

The Concert Tonight

The New York Herald thus describes the visit of the "Rooney Boys" Concert Company to the White House.

After the concert the children fled into the state dining room for refreshments, after which the walls rung with merriment seldom known in the stately old mansion.

Lands Not Open

At that time the matter will be laid before the President who will be asked to open the lands not apportioned to Indians, so entry.

I have seen beautiful baby clothes used to stuff open places in shacks that should have been fixed with lumber. Wait until the relief organization is more perfect unless you receive a special appeal from a responsible source.

"Nobody worries about the future of San Francisco, but no one will rent or lease their property till they learn what the value of it is to be. The committees say that the problem with them is to not pauperize the city by overdoing charity.

CAN BE REPAIRED

Number of San Francisco Buildings That Were Saved

A Salt Lake architect who spent several days in San Francisco, says the following buildings can be repaired for the amounts mentioned: Call, entire building can be repaired within two months for \$15,000; Monadnock, can be restored for \$50,000 floors in perfect condition; Merchants' Exchange was little damaged, save for interior furnishings, and the high building can be restored for \$125,000; Hayward, in many of the offices furniture uninjured and can be restored for \$25,000; Fairmont Hotel, little damaged and can be restored for \$25,000; St. Francis Hotel can be restored for \$75,000; Flood building can be restored in a very short time for \$125,000; Union Trust Company, paint on walls not injured, and damage will not exceed \$80,000; Crocker building in fine condition and damage will be about \$75,000; Kohl building can be repaired for \$10,000.
