FROM WASHINGTON.

THE INFLATION BILL, UNDERGOING RECONSTRUCTION IN THE SENATE. WASHINGTON, April 3.—The financial question has been postponed in the Senate till Monday next to enable the Finance Committee to prepare some amendments.
