The results of yesterday's Congressional elections in this State, as indicated by our special, bear a remarkable resemblance to a juxta handle, in being all one side.


The vote polled in every county heard from has been very small, not exceeding, in many instances, one-tenth of the total number of voters.

PACKARD PREPARING AFFIDAVITS.

"Whom the gods would destroy they first make mad." It would seem almost that there is an epidemic of imbecility running through the leaders of the Radical party in this State, so entirely reckless of consequences have they become.

Notwithstanding the fact that never before in this or any other State has there been a more quiet and peaceful election, a more free and outspoken expression of the people's will, Packard and his fellows, in order to grasp the thistle of public will and save themselves from laceration, have set about their new work. They propose to drown the voice of the suffragans of the State, and under the light of a dark lantern are now at work hatching up a scheme to blot out the Conservative victory of Monday last.

Within the walls of that Radical sanctuary, the Custom-House, they are now at work drawing up affidavits for the Republican Commissioners and United States Supervisors to swear to setting forth that at their several polls there was gross intimidation used towards negro voters, and that by this the Conservative majorities were effected. We do not know, neither do we care how successful he may be in procuring perjurers to attest to this falsehood, but there is one thing of which we are certain and that is that neither Packard's trickery nor Packard's affidavits, though they be piled as high as the building in which they were hatched, will avail them anything in their death throes. The people have spoken. The fiat of the sovereigns of this State has been issued through the ballot boxes on Monday, and those who would disobey it must beware.

Meeting of the First Ward Democratic Club.

Last night there was a hearty response to the call for a meeting of the First Ward torch-light procession here-to-night; thirteen guns were fired; speeches were made by Senator Gordon, Gov. Smith, Mayor Spengler and others. There was an immense crowd.

Mayor Spengler was discharged to-day by Judge Erskine from the charge of a violation of the enforcement act.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

CHARLESTON, Nov. 5.—The News and Courier, from incomplete returns, concedes the election of Chamberlain by about 6000 majority, which would be a Conservative gain of 27,000. It also concedes the election of Wallace, Republican, and Hoge, Republican, to Congress. Rainey's re-election is still in doubt.

VIRGINIA.

RICHMOND, Nov. 5.—A dispatch from Danville claims the election of G. C. Cabell, Conservative, to Congress from the Fifth District, over C. Y. Thomas, Republican, the present incumbent. B. B. Douglass, Conservative, defeats Sener, Republican, present member from the First District. Platt, Republican, is re-elected in the Second District, over Goode, by nearly 300 majority.

There is a probability of a contest in this district, the Conservatives claiming that a large number of fraudulent negro votes were cast, they being temporarily colonized from the Fourth District, Stowell's, in which there was no organized contest. Ex-Gov. Walker's majority in the Third District is over 2600. A Conservative gain over Amble's Smith's vote in 1873 of 3200. The congressional delegation from Virginia stands seven Conservatives to two Republicans. A Conservative gain of three.

MORE ARRESTS.

NEW IBERIA, La., Nov. 5.—Gentlemen from St. Martinville report the arrest day before yesterday, by the Deputy U. S. Marshal, of Gen. DeClout and son, who were both released on bond. Arrested yesterday, Victor Logan, Alfred Patten, Edmund Voorhies, Oscar DeBard and Casimir Wiltz, who are held under guard of a squad of cavalry, with the Marshal.

LATER.—The prisoners arrested in St. Martinville yesterday are still there, in the custody of troops, awaiting a preliminary examination. They were not removed here as reported. Deputy marshal and a squad of cavalry arrived here at noon to-day; another squad from St. Martin arrived this afternoon, with their baggage, etc., and are now camped here. Their mission is so far unknown.

NEW YORK ITEMS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Tammany Hall General Committee and Manhattan Club this evening passed resolutions "congratulating the Democratic party throughout the Union on the magnificent victories achieved by the late elections."

In the matter of Hermann Thomas, charged with forgery in the Kingdom of Bavaria, and whose release was sought on habeas corpus, Judge Blatchford decides that the treaty between the United States and Bavaria was not abrogated by the absorption of the latter's power in the German Empire. The prisoner was remanded for extradition. The decision also covers the case.

STEAMSHIP ST. LOUIS ON FIRE.

SAVANNAH, Ga., Nov. 5.—The steamship St. Louis, from New Orleans for Liverpool, put in this morning with cotton on fire. Assistance has been sent to her at Venus Point.



THE ELECTIONS.

THE TRIBUNE SUMMARY.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Nine States, Delaware, Maryland, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, New Jersey, New York, Tennessee and Virginia have chosen Legislatures which will elect Democratic United States Senators; five of these are now represented by Republicans.

In five others, Louisiana, Illinois, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin, the Legislature is either doubtful or has in its independent elements, which will be likely to secure the election of anti-Administration candidates. The present returns indicate that the Democrats will have a majority of between 50 and 60 in the next House of Representatives.

In Massachusetts the Democratic majority for Governor is about 8000; there is a gain of 8 opposition Congressmen with another District in doubt.

In Pennsylvania the result is doubtful. The Republicans admit a loss of 13,000 votes on the State ticket. The opposition have elected 14 Congressmen; a gain of 9.

The Democrats have elected their Governor in New Jersey by 8000 majority. The opposition gain 3 Congressmen. The contest between William Walter Phelps and Cutler, in the Fifth District, can only be decided by the official canvass.

The Republicans have a majority of twenty-five on joint ballot in the Wisconsin Legislature, but Senator Carpenter's re-election is by no means sure.

Delaware has elected a Democratic Governor, Congressmen and Legislature.

The Kellogg clique is said to be trying to count in the Administration State ticket in Louisiana, but the Conservatives claim the State by 12,000 majority, have secured the Legislature, and consequently a United States Senator, and have elected four Congressmen, a gain of three.

In Illinois the Reform party has carried the State by a small majority, and the opposition has gained seven Congressmen.

Michigan has elected a Democratic Legislature and has sent three or four opposition candidates to Congress—all gains.

Tennessee has elected a Democratic Governor by 30,000 majority and has gained five opposition Congressmen.

Alabama has elected a Democratic Governor by about 10,000 majority, and has gained two opposition Congressmen.

In South Carolina the result is still doubtful, with the chances in favor of Chamberlain's election as Governor.

[Note.—Our dispatches are still more favorable to the Conservatives.]

ALABAMA.

MONTGOMERY, Nov. 5.—The dispatches still show Democratic gains. The Legislature is about 60 Democrats to 40 Republicans. The returns from the Second District are not all in, and the chances are in favor of the election of Williams, Democrat.

The Democratic gain in the Mobile District is very large and hopes are entertained of Bromberg's election. This would make the delegation 7 to 1, leaving Hays alone, who is re-elected by an increased majority. Bayonets were scattered all through his district. The people here are wild with joy; business has been virtually suspended since Tuesday morning. Congratulations are the order of the day.

MONTGOMERY, Nov. 9.—Williams, Democrat, is certainly elected in the Second District, over Rapier, colored, Republican, and the chances are still good for Bromberg.

GEORGIA.

ATLANTA, Nov. 5.—There was a grand torch-light procession here to-night; thirteen guns were fired; speeches were made by Senator Gordon, Gov. Smith, Mayor Spengler and others. There was an immense crowd.

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MISSOURI.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 5.—Returns from the State are still very meagre, but enough is known to show that the Democratic majority is not less than 30,000, and may be over 40,000. The Congressional delegation will be entirely Democratic, a gain of 4 members, but the majorities of the interior members cannot be given.

The districts in this city are as follows: First—E. C. Kehr, Democrat, majority 173 over E. O. Stanard, present incumbent, who ran behind his ticket some 2000; Second—Erasmus Wells, Democrat, majority 5463; Third—Wm. H. Stone, Democrat, present incumbent, majority 1573.

The bitter and persistent contest in the Sixth Ward, between Stillson, Hutchins and W. H. Lockland, for the lower House of the Legislature, was finally settled, after several counts and recounts, in favor of Hutchins, by 77 majority.

LOUISIANA.

LAKE CHARLES, La., Nov. 5.—The Official vote of Cameron parish for Treasurer is Moncreux 203, Dubuclet 47. For Congress, Breaux 1050, Dubuclet 2148. Congress—Breaux 1045, Darral 2149. Legislature—Clark, Conservative, 1046; Pile, Republican, 2139; Antoine, Conservative, 811; Sutton, Republican, 2123. The Republicans elected their entire parish ticket.

FRANKLIN, Nov. 5.—The following is the vote of St. Mary: For Treasurer—Moncreux 1050, Dubuclet 2148. Congress—Breaux 1045, Darral 2149. Legislature—Clark, Conservative, 1046; Pile, Republican, 2139; Antoine, Conservative, 811; Sutton, Republican, 2123. The Republicans elected their entire parish ticket.

PENNSYLVANIA.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 5.—The Evening Telegraph says: "The Democratic State ticket is pretty certainly elected. Gen. McCandless, Democrat, has undoubtedly defeated Gen. Beath, Republican, for Secretary of Internal Affairs. Judge Olmstead, the Republican candidate for Lieutenant Governor, leads his ticket here and elsewhere, and may possibly be elected by a small majority, but the chances appear to be against him."

The Senate will stand 28 Republicans to 22 Democrats, but the House will have from 10 to 12 Democratic majority, making the Legislature Democratic on joint ballot and securing them a United States Senator in place of Scott, Republican.

TENNESSEE.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 5.—In the First Tennessee District McFarland, Dem., has 1500 majority, a Democratic gain of 5000. In the Second District the Republicans have only 400 majority, a Democratic gain of 6000. Maynard, for Governor, was beaten in his own district, and 40,000 in the State. Knox county elected the entire Democratic ticket. In the Third District Dibbell, Dem., has 4000 majority, a Democratic gain of 5000. The Democrats are jubilant over their immense gains.

NASHVILLE, Nov. 5.—The Legislature stands: Senate twenty-three Democrats, two Republicans, with six or seven Republicans in the Lower House. The Democratic majority for Governor will be between forty and forty-five thousand.

ARKANSAS.

LITTLE ROCK, Nov. 5.—From official returns so far received the Democrats claim the election of their entire Congressional ticket by the following majorities: Gause, First District, from 4000 to 5000; Slemmons, Second District, 800 to 1500; Wilshire, Third District, 3500 to 4500.

NEVADA.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5.—The Democrats have carried Nevada.

WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—The Secretary of the Treasury appointed Charles Guirkin, Superintendent of Life Savings Institutions on the coast of Virginia and North Carolina, also, Simon Flatow, Inspector of tobacco, snuff and cigars, New Orleans.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—The fifth game between Garner and Daniels was won by the former in the 31st inning. Score—Garner 300, Daniels, 167.

SPECIE IN THE BANK OF FRANCE.

PARIS, Nov. 5.—Specie in the Bank of France increased three and one third millions.

N. Y. CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—The Chamber of Commerce to-day appointed Wm. H. Fogg, J. S. T. Stranahan, John F. Hency, George Opydke and E. R. Durkee a committee to represent that body at the Second Annual Convention of the American Cheap Transportation Association at Richmond, Va., on the 1st December proximo.

THE BURNING SHIP.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5.—Particulars of the burning of the coal-laden ship off the Marquesas Islands, state that the first mate and one of the crew reached Marquesas in safety. The second mate and four of the crew were picked up. A boat with Capt. Foster and the remainder of the crew—number not known—captured, and all were lost.

MEMPHIS ITEMS.

MEMPHIS, Nov. 5.—Enoch M. Leaming, of Nobleville, Hamilton county, Indiana, was found dead in bed in a boarding-house on Main street, this morning, having suicided with strychnine. He left a letter to his wife and children and a request to the Masonic fraternity to bury him.

Capt. Thomas F. Wright, a well-known steamboatman, died here to-day.

In the suit of Wm. M. Farrington against the Memphis City Railway for \$12,000 for services as president, and against which the company brought a counter suit for \$100,000 for alleged damages sustained under Farrington's administration, the jury returned a verdict granting Farrington nearly \$12,000, and the counter suit was thrown out of court.

FOREIGN NEWS.

BAYONNE.

BAYONNE, Nov. 5.—The bombardment of Irun by the Carlists is thus far conducted on a small scale. Six Republicans have been killed and ten wounded. One hundred and fifty Carlists from Estella have surrendered to the Republicans.

A force of national troops under Jewell has defeated a band of Carlists at the town of Albeiro, province of Valencia. Many of the insurgents were killed.

SANTANDER.

SANTANDER, Nov. 5.—The Republican army of the North resumed operations against the Carlists on the 2nd inst. The headquarters have been removed to Canico.

Gen. Lonio has embarked here with eight battalions of troops for the purpose of relieving Irun.

LONDON.

LONDON, Nov. 5.—A dispatch to the Pall Mall Gazette, from Berlin, says it is reported in Diplomatic circles in that city, that the relations between the Czar and President Serrano, have assumed a thoroughly cordial character, and it is expected Russia will, in short time, formally recognize the Republican Government of Spain.

SHIP FARADAY, Nov. 3, 1 P. M.—Latitude 50:14, longitude 28:07.—Have paid out 176 knots of cable. A heavy northwest gale prevails.

Nov. 4, 8 A. M.—The gale is abating, but there is a very high sea. Have shifted the paying out from the fore to the aft tank. Have successfully paid out 871 knots.

Nov. 4, P. M.—Latitude 50:03, Longitude 30:50. Have paid out 893 knots. A strong gale and high cross sea prevail. We are going at full steam, with fore and aft canvas set.

Nov. 5, 8 A. M.—Have paid out 129 knots of cable since last report. There is a heavy swell.
