PROPOSED AMENDMENT
TO THE
CONSTITUTION.
The State of Ohio,
Office of the Secretary of State.
I, **WILLIAM HENRY SMITH,** Secretary of
State of the State of Ohio, do hereby certify
that the following is a true copy of the
joint resolution passed by the General As-
sembly of the State of Ohio, on the 6th day
of April, A. D. 1867, taken from the original
rolls on file in this office.
In Testimony Whereof, I have here-
unto subscribed my name and af-
fixed the great Seal of the State of
Ohio, at Columbus, the 6th day of
April, A. D. 1867.

A RESOLUTION
Relative to an Amendment of the Constitu-
tion, providing for the extension of the
elective franchise.
Resolved by the General Assembly of the
State of Ohio, (three-fifths of the members
elective to each House agreeing thereto),
That it be and is hereby proposed to the
electors of this State to vote at the next annual
October election, upon the approval or re-
jection of the following amendment as a
substitute for the first section of the fifth Ar-
ticle of the Constitution of this State, to-wit:
Every male citizen of the United States, of
the age of twenty-one years, who shall have
been a resident of the State one year
next preceding the election, and of the
county, township, or ward in which
he resides, such time as may be pro-
vided by law, except such persons as have
borne arms in support of any insurrection or
rebellion against the government of the Uni-
ted States, or have fled from their places of
residence to avoid being drafted into the mili-
tary service thereof, or have deserted the
military or naval service of said government
in time of war, and have not subsequently
been honorably discharged from the same,
shall have the qualifications of an elector
and be entitled to vote at all elections.

turn the taste of the pupil. They must be studied
carefully with reference to the innumerable marks of
expression and ornamentation. Upon the minute
accuracy with which these are accomplished de-
pends the actual sterling advancement of the pupil;
any evasion or slurring in these respects is like and
effort utterly wasted, while, on the other hand, a
close and patient investigation, and open to the stu-
dent the means and resources by which great artists
produce their most brilliant and profound effects—
