Massacre of Capt. Garrison's Party.

St. Louis, Nov. 30. The Salt Lake mail has arrived at Independence and brings intelligence of the massacre of Captain Garrison and his exploring party.

The killed were Capt. Garrison and Mr. Keam, the Typographical Engineer, Mr. Porter, a guide, two others and three privates of Company A, Mounted Riflemen.

Capt. Garrison and twelve of his party had separated from the main body, and while at breakfast a band of Indians, intending to destroy the Mormon village, near at hand, came upon them, fired with rifles and then resumed with bows and arrows, which was returned by Garrison's party, but were overpowered, and only four escaped the merciless hands of the savage.

Garrison had 26 arrows in his body, and when found, one of his hands was off. The notes of the survey, which had nearly been completed, and instruments and all made were taken. Gov. Young sent to Capt. Morris to release him from his critical position in the midst of the Indians, and endeavor to regain his lost property.

The party intended soon going into Winter quarters. A party of Cheyens surrounded the mail and demanded nearly all the provisions, which were given them.

Serenade of John Mitchell, Esq. New York, Dec. 1-3 P. M. Last evening the whole of the Irish organization in Brooklyn, this city, and Jersey City, together with an immense number of American citizens assembled in front of his residence in Brooklyn.

At least 10,000 persons were on the spot, and the greatest enthusiasm prevailed. Short and spirited speeches were made by Mitchell and Meagher, and all of the military bands united in a splendid serenade.

The Common Council of Brooklyn last night passed resolutions tendering the hospitalities of the city to Mitchell.

Yankee Sullivan is again in the hands of the Sheriff of Westchester County, who claims to take Yankee as a prisoner for a violation of his parole of honor not to fight or to engage in a fight again, given to the State a few years since when he was under sentence for the affair of Lily and McCary.

Redemption of Public Stocks. WASHINGTON, Dec. 1. An official notice published in the Union from the Secretary of the Treasury extending the time for the purchase of United States Stock to January next, in addition to the usual guarantee.

Holders must distinctly assign their interest on the same now made at the Treasury or transmit to the semi-annual Congress as the case may be to afford distant bond holders an opportunity to avail themselves of the notice.

Stock mailed at any time previous to the first of January, will be considered by the department as entitled to its benefits.

Whole amount in the Treasury subject to draft, Nov. 28th, was \$24,461,556.

LETTER FROM EUROPE. New York, Nov. 30. The steamer Atlantic arrived this morning, bringing dates to the 10th ult.

Nothing really later has occurred in reference to the Turkish war, but we have rumors of a decisive battle fought near Bucharest. It is not known who had the victory.

Details of the recent affair at Oltenez, which was a brilliant Turkish victory, represents 1200 Russians killed and wounded.

Turkey have nearly 100,000 men across the Danube. The Turks captured eight guns at Oltenez on the 4th ult.

Poles in the Russian service are disaffected, and favored the passage of the Danube, giving no alarm when they saw the Turks crossing.

Russia lays an embargo on the Turkish shipping from the 22d. Neutral flags will be respected.

Count Nesselrod's diplomatic circular is published, and has excited strong remarks from the French and British press.

Turkey will have nothing to do with the amendment to the Vienna no e, but insists on a perfectly new treaty to settle the future.

Klappa will receive the command in the Danube service. Circassians continue to have success in Asia.

Napoleon expresses himself strongly in favor of active operation in aid to the Sultan.

The British government evidently vacillates. Persia notifies that it reserves to itself liberty of action in Eastern affairs.

Austria professes neutrality. Shanghai was captured by the Chinese insurgents on the 7th Sep.

VIENNA, Monday Nov. 8.—Latest.—On the 11th the Russian commander moved forward with 240,000 men, mostly infantry; they met the forces of the Sultan, when a pitched battle ensued.

For a second time the Russians were compelled to retreat in disorder on Bucharest, having lost in four attacks on Oltenez, 3000 men—this is reliable.

On the 9th Oltenez was driven from the island opposite Icerigo. Reinforcements came when he retook the island and held it.

English operatives have all been discharged from the Russian Navy Yards by the Czar.

It is reported that the Sultan has placed himself at the head of the army. Rumors of an alliance between Russia and Dost Mohammed reached England from different sources.

Letters from Cabel state that a large Russian army were marching from the capital of Khiva, with the avowed purpose

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
