The Parish Court which has been in session since Monday the 5th inst., Judge A. J. Moss, presiding has closed its labors; we are happy to state that a great many cases, some of long standing and of most intricate legal nature have been disposed of. At this term of our Parish Court we were happy to meet Col. A. Deblanc, Col. D. O'Bryan, Jos. A. Breaux, Esq., and Felix Voorhies, Esq., members of the Bar from the adjoining parishes.

Our crops are such as none better can be desired. and we will further state that the impending drought, was cheerfully relieved by copious and benignant showers, during the past week. Our already parching fields have again donned their rich green and now present to the tiller and the community generally, richer promises of harvest, than they did before. In fact we must frankly state the fact that with the present condition of our crops, no unforeseen accidents befalling the planters, there will be again peace and abundance, nay, wealth in the old Atakapas country.

Health.—With the exception of a few cases of measles and scarlet fever—the health of our parish is good. Those who from the North and West of our country or any other portion thereof, would be disposed to immigrate in our midst can do so in all safety—they must not be deterred by any vague or false notions of the unhealthy condition of our section of country. Its health is equal to that of any other.

On last Tuesday evening, one Louis, colored, was shot and killed on Cite Gales, in this parish; three buckshot piercing the left breast and producing instantaneous death. A Coroner's inquest was held over the body, but all testimony elicited before the presiding magistrate, could give no clue as to the perpetrator of the deed, or the causes which led to the act.

The weather is dry and the heat oppressive, more so than is usual at this season of the year. Old Sol pours down upon us his most scorching rays and we have heard some of our oldest citizens say this never before had they experienced such summer heat, as early in the season.

Her death has been a gloom over a large circle of friends. She was a lady of fine literary attainments.

How long have we been listening to the bright prospects of having, one day, a Railroad in our midst. How long have we been indulging the airy hope of having the iron horse snorting and puffing and seeing the smoke from his nostrils curling and misting over the lightning track—and all was but sad deception, sore disappointment; but not so now. The dreams of by gone days are about being realized, if it be true that coming events cast their shadows before them; we have had in our midst Mr. Walton, chief engineer, and Mr. Thomas Kleinpeter, assistant engineer of the Memphis, New Orleans and Chattanooga Railroad Company. They have reached our town, or rather the Bayou Vermilion, at or near Col. Creighton's, in their survey of the projected route from New Orleans to Texas, running through our country; they are now running two lines, one in close proximity South and the other in close proximity North of Vermilionville. Some may again prove unbelieving to the realization of the grand, much and long wished for scheme, but we can assure them that there is nothing in the world that guarantees more the advent of a steam car, or looks more like a Railroad than an Engineer, representative of a wealthy and determined Company of Capitalists laying out different routes, susceptible of being run over by the cars. We hail the advent in our midst of Messrs. Walton and Kleinpeter and those under them with unfeigned delight; may success attend their efforts and our wishes.

While on the subject of Railroads, we must add that we are to have a Road sure. Even supposing that the Chattanooga Company do not build the Road, we will state that a few days ago, as we were coming from New Orleans, we met C. A. Whitney, Esq., of the house of C. A. Whitney & Co., of that city, agent and son-in-law of Mr. Charles Morgan, who with experienced hands was fathoming Berwick Bay to ascertain what point would secure the most advantageous, easiest and least costly crossing, stating with this, we are told, that it is the intention of Mr. Morgan to push through, the now existing line, from Brashear over the old grading to Texas. If all this does not bid fair to give us a road soon, then all signs must fail—viz: On the one hand the Chattanooga Company is zealous and determined to build the road from Mobile via New Orleans, the Coast, St. Martinville to the great Empire State of the Southwest; and on the other hand, we see the well marked determination of Mr. Morgan, whether in a feeling of self defence, or self preservation, to keep from burning his ships, or a feeling of speculation, to carry on the work already commenced for years back, to its original destination.

Our citizens can rest assured that all these signs are not and cannot be deceiving—they mean a great deal, they mean Railroad, Railroad at no distant day, and destined to strike Vermilionville. Let us look up and be of good cheer.

We gather the following items from the Planters' Banner of the 14th:

GERMAN TERRY.—The Germans have improved the general appearance of Franklin since the war more than all the rest of the population. They have bought old buildings and repaired them, rearranged and painted, fitted up new fences and gates and they show that they are a live people. And these men have made their money as butchers, shoemakers, tailors, carriage and harness makers, and as members of different useful trades and callings. Our German population are generally useful, industrious and honest, and they are entitled to all the prosperity they enjoy. Germans have no idlers among them.

THE CROPS.—The crops of cane and corn generally look well in this parish, notwithstanding the superabundance of rain in the last thirty days. A few of the crops are not promising, on account of rotten seed cane and a bad stand. The planters are doing their level best between showers to clean out their crops, and some of them have succeeded in laying by their cane and corn in good order. But the rains have annoyed them seriously, and will doubtless reduce the general yield of sugar below the figures made by most of our planters in June.

STARCHING OFF.—There is still great complaint by many of our planters of the faithlessness of portions of their hands in leaving them, to loaf in our villages, or to hire with other men, when the crops press for labor, and the laying by season is rapidly passing away. These things war the people of the rapid decay of the present field labor on which the landholders depend. This drives the people to send agents to Europe and Asia to inquire for laborers to supply the place of those who are passing away.

We learn that Mr. John Hays of Iberia parish, died last Sunday morning aged about 95 years. He lived nearly 80 years on Salt Island, and was a native of Pennsylvania.

A New Political Movement in Louisiana.

The following, cut from the Radical Standard, published in New Orleans, was sent to this office by mail, but the circular of which it complains, was not sent. We will publish the circular, if we can find it in the columns of any of our exchanges, that the people may see what this monstrous thing means. The Standard says:—Banner.

Reader, have you seen that mysterious circular addressed to the people of Louisiana? It was evidently written by a "big-brother," as Wendell Phillips would call him. It proposes to take a middle, conservative course in politics, and build up a party whose creed is to be "honesty and intelligence." As the negro is generally supposed to be ignorant of course, he is not expected to have a finger in the pie. We don't know how to account for it, but such things will come into our hands. People will continue to send us such secret things, and we think it would be rather greenness on our part if we did not give our readers a share of them. The circular is worded with great care, and here and there can be found such morsels as are served out from Camp street. The concern is evidently the embryo of a "white man's party," and it reads mightily in the interest and support of our State Government. The language and plans of the circular are dictated by the mysterious "we," but there are no names signed at the bottom. It is certainly the work of a soulless compromiser, and its hidden designs are to sell out the colored man in order to keep the eyes of our colored men open, we publish this circular on another page. Let every colored man read it, and satisfy himself that somebody who is feeding at the State crib is making plans to sell him out.

Rawlins and Forney have fallen out, and according to the old adage, the people have now a prospect of coming by their due. It seems that one fruitful source of pap to Forney's two papers was the War Department, he claiming the legal right to print every advertisement issued therefrom. SENATOR RAY'S EXPULSION DEMANDED.

Under this head the Monroe Telegraph, of June 30, brings to light certain documents bearing damaging evidences of "disloyalty" on the part of Senator Ray and his brother in the days when the fate of "the best Government the world ever saw" was trembling in the balance. These documents are the joint oath of John and Robert Ray, as attorneys at law, taken and subscribed to March 17, 1864, before the district judge—this was the Confederate Test Oath—and oath taken by John when accepting the appointment of district attorney pro tem. At the same time he was holding the position of parish treasurer and that of State agent under Gov. Allen. In this latter oath the affiant swears that he will "preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of this State, and of the Confederate States, so help me (him) God." On the organization of the Senate, Mr. Ray took what was known as the Federal iron clad oath, when he swore, among other averments, as follows:—

"That I have voluntarily given no aid, countenance, counsel, or encouragement to persons engaged in armed hostility thereto; that I have neither sought nor accepted, nor attempted to exercise the functions of any office whatever, under any authority or pretended authority in hostility to the United States; that I have not yielded a voluntary support to any pretended government, authority, power or constitution within the United States, hostile or inimical thereto."

The editor of the Telegraph has been fumbling over the dusty tomes in the office of the Ouachita Parish Clerk, and these are a few of the damning documents that have fallen under his wary pen. Give us all; let us bazon to the world the record of every one of these "renegade rebels" now waxing fat and insolent in the spoilation and humiliation of their country. (N. O. Playmate.

A STORY FOR YOUNG MEN.

Several years ago a youth of sixteen years, of good sense, and a fair English education, not having profitable employment at his father's home in Kentucky, sought for employment among his enterprising neighbors a few miles distant; and although wages were low in those days of gold and silver currency, he saved from his first year's wages \$70. He was then seventeen years old, healthy, lively looking, aspiring and ambitious to become useful, noble and perhaps great. He had already learned that money loaned at high rates of interest was oppressive to the borrower, and reacted on the lender, and in the falling of prices of nearly all articles in the commercial world; that men sought justification for their bankruptcy and delinquency in the fact that they had paid large rates of interest. Feeling, therefore, that a liberality, as well as justice, was necessary to every man's dealing with his fellow men, he loaned his \$70 to an enterprising, enterprising, and prosperous trading man in his neighborhood, at the lowest rate of interest known in business in that State, viz: six per cent per annum. He worked another year, clothed himself in neat Kentucky jeans and other cheap but neat articles of apparel, and went to a country school three months in the winter of that year, and learned the rudiments of Latin and something of the higher branches of mathematics, working for a prosperous and liberal farmer of evenings to pay the board, and at the end of the second year, or when he was eighteen years of age, he had saved \$96 more. His character of industry and integrity began to be better known in the neighborhood, and his services were sought for.

He worked on a farm and rode as collector for trading men and the sheriff of his county; and at the end of his nineteenth year had saved \$110 more. With the interest accumulated on his other two years' wages he had now \$300, was comfortably clothed, and had a good business education, which he improved from one winter to another, till he became a scholar, both literally and scientifically. His influence and usefulness increasing he had, at the age of twenty years, \$480. At twenty-one he had accumulated \$650, and was well known for his activity of life, as a young man of intelligence, virtue, and usefulness, as well as being a young man of very attractive manners and ways.

He moved to a western State where land was cheap, and entered 160 acres by a land warrant, which he purchased with \$150 of his money. He made a good selection of land, in a good region of country; he used a portion of the balance of his money in improving his land, buying a little stock, and a few implements for farming, and the second year he raised a small crop.

Having gone to his new neighborhood with about \$400 in money, and used it cautiously, he by degrees gained the name of a responsible citizen and a good pay master, and his influence rose gradually from his appearance among his new and scattering neighbors. Year after year he raised a crop, continuing to read the best newspapers, periodicals, and books, which still further improved his mind, till sheep, cattle and other stock grew up in flock around him, more land adjoining him being purchased from time to time, till now he finds himself, when scarcely arrived at the middle of life, a gentleman farmer of wealth, surrounded by comfort and many luxuries, esteemed by neighbors both far and near, and would receive the suffrage of those who know him to any office for which he might be nominated, irrespective of party politics, so firm is their confidence in both his ability and integrity.
