A Kansas City despatch says that the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe road is having constructed in Boston the largest locomotive ever built, which will be used for drawing fast trains between Kansas City and Chicago. The following is a description of the locomotive: It has a double firebox with heating surface of 1,650 square feet, the drive wheels being 6 feet 8 inches in diameter. One of the peculiar features of it consists in a steam pump, which pumps back the exhaust steam, thereby saving fuel. The wheels are of paper, and the boiler, instead of being built of stay bolts, are heavily corrugated on the inside. The engineer's cab is located on the top and over the centre of the boiler, while the fireman occupies a second cab in the rear of the boiler. The weight of the engine is fifty five tons. It is estimated by the builder that this locomotive can haul ten cars over an ordinary road at a speed of eighty miles an hour with ease.

Some time since the State Soldiers Home of Louisiana made an appeal for assistance to enable them to defray the expenses thereof for 1888 and 1889, as the institution was very much in need. This appeal coming to the attention of our Police Jury, that body at its meeting on Monday last passed an ordinance appropriating one hundred and fifty dollars to the aid of the Home. This was a most praiseworthy act, and will no doubt be approved by every taxpayer in the parish.—Vidalia Sentinel.

EASTER.
A correspondent of the Courier-Journal asks: "As Easter commemorates the resurrection of Christ, why is it not an anniversary occurring on the same day of the month in each year, just as in the case of Washington's birthday?"
Which the Courier-Journal answers as follows: Easter is a festival, the period of whose observance is a matter of decree of church councils. It is generally believed that it was observed by the successors of the Apostles about A. D. 63. The Council of Arles, in 314, decreed that the day for keeping this festival should be the Sunday after the 14th day of the March moon, and the Council of Nice, in 325, confirmed this decision. The Roman method was not established in France till 525, and in Britain and Ireland till about 800. By the alteration of the calendar by Gregory XIII, in 1582, the first Sunday after the full moon immediately following March 21 was fixed as the day for observing this festival.

THE PARADOXES OF SCIENCE.
The water, says a writer in Blackwood's Magazine, which drowns us, a fluent stream, can be walked upon as ice. The bullet which, when fired from a musket carries death, will be harmless if ground to dust before being fired. The crystallized part of the oil of roses—so grateful in its fragrance, a solid at ordinary temperatures, though readily volatile—is a compound substance containing exactly the same elements, and in exactly the same proportions, as the gas with which we light our streets. The tea which we daily drink with benefit and pleasure produces palpitation, nervous tremblings, and even paralysis if taken in excess; yet the peculiar organic agent called theine, to which tea owes its qualities, may be taken by itself (as theine, not as tea,) without any appreciable effect. The water which will allay our burning thirst augments it when congealed into snow; so that it is stated by explorers of the Arctic regions that the natives prefer enduring the utmost extremity of thirst rather than attempt to remove it by eating snow. Yet if the snow be melted, it becomes drinkable water. Nevertheless, although if melted before entering the mouth, it assuages thirst like other water, when melted in the mouth it has the opposite effect. To render this paradox still more striking, we have only to remember that ice, which melts more slowly in the mouth, is very efficient in allaying thirst.
