MASS MEETING.

LAFAYETTE, La., April 26th, 1890.
A large mass meeting was held to-day at the Lafayette Court House, in the interest of the Anti-Lottery movement. At 11 o'clock sharp, the meeting was called to order by Robt. C. Greig; Mr. Greig called Hon. Alex. Delhomme, as temporary chairman. On motion, duly seconded Mr. Delhomme was elected permanent chairman. In brief and appropriate remarks, the chairman stated the object of the meeting. Messrs. R. C. Greig and Julian Mouton were chosen secretaries. The chair then appointed the following gentlemen as vice presidents of the meeting:

On motion of Dr. Mayer, duly seconded, the chairman appointed the following named gentleman a committee to prepare an address to the people, in behalf of the Anti-Lottery League: Dr. G. W. Mr. R. C. Greig offered the following resolutions which were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That this meeting heartily endorses the views expressed in the Caddo address to the people of North Louisiana on the Lottery question.

Resolved, That our Representative and Senator in the Legislature are hereby earnestly requested to vigorously oppose the rechartering or continuance of the La. Lottery and to keep the question out of politics, by refusing to submit the question to a vote of the people either in the form of an amendment to the Constitution or a constitutional amendment.

Resolved, That the secretaries prepare a paper embodying the above views, for the signatures of all persons approving them and that they transmit copies of the same and of the proceedings of this meeting to our Representative and Senator, Speaker of the House, President of the Senate, and Executive Committee Anti-Lottery League of Louisiana.

Several local speakers were then called upon and delivered forcible and brilliant addresses to the assembly, which created considerable enthusiasm.

There being no further business the meeting then adjourned.


