The official statistics of the production of salt in the United States during the calendar year 1896 have been compiled by Statistician E. W. Parker, of the United States geological survey. The report shows the total production was 13,666,649 barrels of 280 pounds each. The valuation of the product is \$4,423,086. These figures show an increase of 600,000 barrels in product \$300,000 in value. The biggest state product was in New York, with 6,795,616 barrels, an amount double that of Michigan, which comes next in quantity.

Mr. J. Melebeck, a merchant of Abbeville, has gone to New Orleans this week to arrange for getting a patent on a flying machine. This machine is not much larger than a water bucket, is light, and yet is of such power that the inventor claims he can lift with it 570 pounds. Mr. Melebeck did not fly over to New Orleans on his machine, but was content to travel on the railroad, carrying his machine with him and now it is in the range of possibilities that the first "air line" in the world will be between Abbeville and New Iberia. The Bicycle Craze, Erroneously Termed.
EFFECT IT HAS UPON MANY LINES OF BUSINESS.

Many people have attempted to cry down the bicycle, claiming that it is consuming the spare change of the rising generation. While it is an acknowledged fact that an investment in a bicycle has proved to be nature's own remedy in building a strong constitution, it has served to keep many young men out of the saloon and away from bad company and evil influences and spending his money at games of chance and other well-known channels.

It also has instilled into the youth lessons of economy and self-denial, for the cost of a bicycle is quite a large sum to invest, in fact it seems a small fortune to a young man of poor parentage or in medium circumstances, and to acquire the requisite amount necessitates many economies and deprivations which go far to building up the manly and noble young man, and in justice to the wheel be it said that it was a happy day to the community in general when the skill of man placed it in its present state of perfection.

Its effect upon many lines of commerce has been most marked, from which has arisen much of the unwarranted and narrow opposition. Its effect upon the livery business was seemingly the first to show in the decreased demand for pleasure vehicles, and following close upon this was the street railway's wail from their loss of business, the bicycle superceding the street car as a means of transportation to and from their daily occupation.

It has perceptibly effected the watch making industry and jewelry trade, many purchasing the wheel in preference to a watch or jewels. The bicycle trade as an industry now ranks as one giving employment, to more men than any other industry and the amount of capital invested is almost beyond computation.

FALK'S X RAYS.

Exhibited for the Benefit of the Arena Club.
Last night Mr. H. L. Falk gave a practical demonstration of his X rays to the Arena Club, which had been invited by him to investigate his system.

Quite a number of the members were present, and a committee, called the investigating committee, was appointed, consisting of Dr. J. M. Ferguson and Messrs. T. P. Flaherty, J. P. Thornbury and L. C. Ferrall.
Dr. Ferguson's brain was first photographed, then the hand of Miss Bessie Rummels, who claimed that she had a portion of a needle in the flesh of her hand. This however, did not appear on the plate, which was explained by Mr. Falk, who said that evidently the bony structure of the hand interfered.

The next photograph taken was that of the hand of Dr. Ferguson. During the war Dr. Ferguson received a pistol wound in the hand, which resulted in shattering the bones of the hand in such a manner that the knuckle bones never assumed their normal shape. Before submitting his hand to be photographed, the doctor secreted a small watch key between the second and third fingers, without informing Mr. Falk. This was intended to be a test of the genuineness of the method used by Mr. Falk.

The exposure was duly made, taking about twelve minutes, and when the plate was developed the peculiar structure of the shattered bones of the doctor's hand came out perfectly, as did the watch key, showing the shape of the key in such a manner that it was possible to recognize the object.—Picayune.
