## City Council Proceedings.

Lafayette, La., July 8, 1903.—A regular meeting of the City Council was held this day, Mayor Chas. D. Caffery presiding. Members present: A. E. Mouton, D. V. Gardebled, H. L. Fontenot, M. Rosenfeld, G. A. DeBlanc, Abbeout, Demanade.

On motion duly seconded and carried, the following ordinance was adopted:

AN ORDINANCE to prevent the spread of fire in the town of Lafayette, La.  
Be it ordained by the City Council of the town of Lafayette, La., that in order to prevent the spread of fire in said town, the buildings of buildings of wood construction be as frame buildings, within the following limits, to hereby prohibited and declared to be unlawful, to-wit:

1. In that part of square No. 3 in McComb addition in said town which is bounded Northerly by an alley, Southerly by Lincoln avenue, Easterly by Walnut street and Westerly by Chestnut street.

2. Also in that part of square No. 25 in said McComb addition bounded Northerly by Lincoln avenue, Southerly by an alley, Easterly by Walnut street and Westerly by Chestnut street.

3. Also on lots 1 to 13 both inclusive of square No. 4 of said McComb addition.

4. Also on lots 1 to 4 both inclusive of square No. 24 in the town of Lafayette, La., bounded Northerly by the town of Lafayette, La., Southerly by the town of Lafayette, La., Easterly by the town of Lafayette, La., and Westerly by the town of Lafayette, La.

5. Also the Southern 1/2 of block No. 3 of said McComb addition which is bounded Northerly by an alley, Southerly by Lincoln avenue, Easterly by Grant avenue and Westerly by Cypress street.

6. Also the square of ground in said McComb addition bounded Northerly by Lincoln avenue, Southerly by Sixth street, Easterly by Cypress street and Westerly by Grant avenue and Westerly by Cypress street.

7. Also the block in said McComb addition known as the "Mansion Block" bounded Northerly by Lake street, Southerly by Sixth street, Easterly by Cypress street and Westerly by Grant avenue and Westerly by Cypress street.

8. Also on the lot 203 and the west half of the block bounded northerly by Jefferson and Pierce streets, southerly by Monroe street, easterly by Congress street and westerly by Vermillion street, and west half including lots 191 to 194, both inclusive as well as said lot 208, and lot 195 in same said block.

9. Also on lots 238, 242, 260 and 280, according to the plat of the town of Lafayette and in that part known as the old corporation.

10. Also on the following lots fronting on the south side of Vermillion street in said town, to-wit: lots 231, 232, 237, 24, 83 and also the following lots fronting on Jefferson street, to-wit: 81, 82, 83.

11. Also on the entire block which is bounded North by Vermillion street, south by Maine street and west by Madison street.

12. Also on lots 118 and 118 lying on north line of Vermillion street.

13. Also on the entire block bounded north by Vermillion street, south by Maine street, east by Madison street and west by Lafayette street.

14. Also on the north half of the block which is bounded north by Maine street, south by Second street, east by Madison street and west by Lafayette street.

15. Also on the east half of the block which is bounded north by Maine street and west by Washington street.

16. Also on the north half of the block which is bounded north by Maine street, south by Second street, east by Madison street and west by Lafayette street.

Be it further ordained that no building even of brick or other inflammable material such as is prescribed by this ordinance shall be built in said limits unless and until a permit for the same shall have been issued by the mayor of said town.

Be it further ordained that no building shall be constructed within the limits hereinabove prescribed of any other material than brick, stone or iron, and all roofs shall be constructed of some recognized fire proof material provided that this ordinance shall not apply to any frame building now actually in the course of construction.

Be it further ordained that the City Council shall have the right to remove any material intended to be used in the construction of any building in contravention of this ordinance, and same to be done at the expense of the person violating the same.

Be it further ordained that this ordinance shall take effect immediately.

## Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat Hospital.

We acknowledge receipt of the thirteenth annual report of the Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat Hospital of New Orleans. This institution was organized in July 1889, and has up to the present given treatment to 66,618 poor people, of whom 14,634 were from the country parishes. They are now appealing to the Police Juries of the different parishes to assist them in the continuation of the charitable work, and no doubt will meet with a ready response.
