Eminently the Proper Thing.

The decision reached by the committee of citizens, while discussing an issue of bonds, afterwards approved of and adopted by the Council, to set aside \$60,000 for a central school building, is eminently the proper one.

Any amount less than that would be insufficient; for in building the school several things must be taken into consideration.

First, material and labor are both high which makes building costly.

Second, Lafayette's school population at present to be comfortably accommodated would require not less than fifteen large rooms and perhaps more.

Third, it would be very shortsighted to build solely for the present when Lafayette is growing so rapidly and within a few years will require double what the present demands.

Fourth, provision must be made for grounds and buildings for a school on the east side of the railroad which is greatly needed for the benefit of the little children.

Fifth, should we display the poor judgment of building regardless of the future, in a few years (and from present indications that means less than five years) we will find ourselves afflicted with the same trouble we have now, children demanding entrance to the schools, and no room for them.

And don't let us overlook the fact that if we vote a tax now, the chance to vote a tax a few years hence to correct any mistake we may make will be exceedingly slim. Then how much more sensible while we are imposing a tax, to extend it a few years longer and get sufficient money to build right!

And don't let us build a barn. Let us build a *Schoolhouse*. Let us erect a structure that will combine the most practical and advanced ideas in school-buildings with the greatest amount of real beauty.

In other words while we are constructing let us construct with a view not alone to mere convenience and usefulness; but with an eye to adding an ornament to the town that you and I can take a true pride in.

The decision to set aside enough money to provide both for the present and near future was eminently correct and when we all have the pleasure of seeing the building hoped for and planned for standing upon the beautiful lot owned by the city, then all of us will be glad the committee showed both wisdom and foresight.
