### PARISH INSTITUTE.

Interesting Sessions Held Friday and Saturday, The Program in Detail.

Friday and Saturday the teachers of the parish held an institute in Lafayette. The first day was devoted to a visit to the town schools by the country teachers, followed in the afternoon by a "critique" in which the good and bad points of the teaching observed were brought out. The day's experiences were thought to have been very helpful. At night a session was held at the courthouse and, as will be seen by the program below, was most interesting. After the night session Manager Salles of The Gordon invited the teachers to the hotel and surprised them with some delightful refreshments and some music to trip the "light fantastic," both of which the teachers enjoyed and appreciated.

Saturday morning and afternoon sessions were held at the Primary school which were very interesting, a number of excellent papers being read, and should have had a larger audience of parents. The public is always cordially invited to attend the institutes and should the mothers and fathers attend they will get an appreciative idea of the spirit animating the teachers and the purpose of what is called the new education, but which needs only to be heard to be recognized as the sensible and true method of teaching. Other institutes will be held and those parents who can possibly spare the time should by all means spend at least a part of the day at the institute.

### CITY COUNCIL.

H. H. Hohorst Appointed to Take the Assessment, Bonds Paid.

New Bond Issue Ordinance Read but Action Deferred till 14th.

The Council met in regular session Monday night and the following were the principal matters considered and acted on:

The offer of H. H. Hohorst to take the assessment and make the roll books for \$150, was accepted.

The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the mayor of Birmingham, Ala., to get information as to the way they are paving their streets under government supervision. The inquiry is to be made with a view to future work on the principal streets of the town.

A communication from the Police Jury in regard to quarantine matters was laid on the table.

\$1500 dollars was appropriated to pay water and light bonds.

The mayor was authorized to accept the transfer of property for the city in widening Madison street, and to pay Mr. Peck the amount specified in the petition for his land.

The resolutions, etc. in regard to the proposed new issue of bonds which were to be submitted by Fulton & Co. who propose to take the bonds if voted, were received and read in open meeting; but no action was taken on request of Attorneys Girard and Caffery who requested the Council to defer action until the ordinances as offered, could be carefully examined.

A resolution was passed closing barbershops on Sunday.

After approval of bills the Council adjourned to meet the 14th.

### The Lafayette and Breaux Bridge Road.

The road connecting Lafayette and Breaux Bridge is in a very bad condition on both sides of bayou Vermilion, and it is particularly so for a distance of about one mile in St. Martin Parish, that portion of the road

being in a really dangerous condition. A long stretch of this road traverses a black, sticky lay of lard that is at a low level and difficult to drain properly, and the roadway is much too narrow to permit anything like good results in road construction.

Recognizing that it would be of great mutual advantage to Lafayette and Breaux Bridge, on account of the intimate business and social relations existing between the towns, to again place this road in good travelling condition and provide for its regular maintenance in the future, Dr. Moss and Mr. J. C. Nickerson, representing the Citizens' Road-building Association, of Lafayette, and Dr. Fourgeaud and Mayor Domengeaux, of Breaux Bridge, appeared before the Police Jury of St. Martin parish last Monday, in the interest of the Lafayette and Breaux Bridge road. The authorities of St. Martin parish promised to give all the aid in their power in the direction named, and placed the matter in the hands of a committee for immediate attention.

Prominent citizens of Breaux Bridge evinced a deep interest in the plans and purposes of the Citizens' Road-building Association, as explained to them by the secretary of the association, Dr. Moss, and purpose to form a similar organization in Breaux Bridge to give special and regular attention to the question of public roads.

Learning the Citizens' Road-building Association intended to double, if possible, the present width of the road to Breaux Bridge in Lafayette parish, the people of Breaux Bridge decided to do likewise for that part of the road lying in St. Martin parish. It is admitted that it will be necessary to do this to be able to accomplish any lasting results in the work of construction soon to be undertaken on both sides of the bayou which marks the division line of the parishes of Lafayette and St. Martin.

Lafayette will be glad to have the co-operation of Breaux Bridge in the work of keeping up a good road between the two towns, which can not prove to be otherwise than of great mutual benefit.
