The Unspeakable Beef Monopoly.

New Orleans States.

Not satisfied with charging the helpless American consumer exorbitant prices for the beef and pork they eat, the Beef Trust is now charged with putting on the market condemned, impure and dangerous products. The charge is made most explicitly by Upton Sinclair, in the current number of Everybody's Magazine, who has assembled his authorities and his evidence in an array so formidable that very much more than general denials will be required from the accused packers. In his article Mr. Sinclair cites in support of his charge decisions of the food inspecting authorities of Minnesota, Pennsylvania, Kentucky, Ohio, North Carolina, Indiana, and North Dakota—decisions plainly condemning the products of J. Ogden Armour, who has recently acted as the spokesman for the Packers' great combine.

It is charged that diseased carcasses of animals after being condemned by the food inspectors are put back into the food supply destined for the home market—the foreign buyer being better protected. In view of the fact that the packers are classed among the "Christian gentlemen" and eminent citizens of the country they can not afford to rest under such an abominable charge and they must at least attempt to disprove it in the courts or in some way to quiet the feeling of anger and disgust aroused by the publication. There is much reason to believe that there is something rotten in Packingtown other than the products sent to the home market, and it will neither be wise nor convincing to attempt to dismiss the charge by saying that its only foundation is in the mind of a Socialist novelist.

Account will have to be taken of the fact that World's Work for May publishes three articles dealing with the same subject, one written by Dr. W. K. Jacques, formerly head of the Chicago meat inspection, one by Caroline Hedger, a practicing woman physician of the packing district, and the last by Thomas W. McKee, a lawyer of the city and the magazine's own representative. In his article Dr. Jacques tells of the strenuous opposition made by the packers to the "Kerosening" of condemned meat, a method that would make it absolutely impossible to market such meat in any form as food.

"I made," he said, "frequent and unannounced visits to the yards. On one occasion I was there at four o'clock in the morn-

ing and visited the Standard Slaughtering Company, which kills the diseased animals condemned by the city government and State inspectors. I saw a load of meat just leaving the place, but was not near enough to identify it. When I entered the house there was no one in sight; nor could I find any one for fifteen minutes. Hanging in the room in full sight, unguarded and open to the public, were two sides of beef having on them the slashes of the State inspector and the government tag of condemnation. But the meat was not under lock and seal as required by government regulations, nor was there any one to prevent its being carried off."

It is possible that the inferences drawn by Dr. Jacques from this and other occurrences that came under his observation and that of others are unwarranted, but it is evident that the allegations are too serious for any attempt to be made to lightly dismiss them on the ground that they are merely the fabrications of cheap sensationalists. The country which only eight years ago was enraged to the point of frenzy by the "embalmed beef" fraud which imperilled the lives of American soldiers, demands the truth, and we believe will find a way to get at it. President Roosevelt, the people remember, when a colonel in Cuba, had some extremely harsh things to say of the meat packers, yet a short time ago these same packers hailed his "muck-rake speech" as a glorious vindication of the methods of their industry. His speech failed most completely, however, to quiet the "men with the muck rakes" who are daily laying bare our corrupt commercialism.
