CITY SCHOOLS AVERAGES.

Attendance and Enrollment for First Term in the City Schools With Percentages.

The following table shows the averages in attendance and enrollment, with the percentages, at the two city schools. It will be noticed that the average percentage at both schools is a little over 86; this is fine evidence that the children and teachers at both schools are interested and doing good work. The large number of promotions shown in the list appearing in this issue is very complimentary to the teachers and pupils alike. The efficiency of a school is largely tested by the interest of the children in their work and by the number of promotions, and the first session's work of the city schools, judged by the table of averages and the promotions in this issue, appears to be very satisfactory. Keeping Watch on the Watts.
 Supt. Voorhies since taking charge of the power plant has endeavored to operate it with all the economy possible while giving good service. In line with this purpose he had tried to develop a system that will keep the operating expenses down to the lowest point and bring up the revenues to the highest point. Mr. Voorhies states that he knows just the number of watts the machines are furnishing and that he is now trying to account for every watt, so that the city may get pay for all the service it furnishes. To aid in this purpose Mr. Voorhies has devised a system for keeping account of all the light users, which he has had printed in book form. The system is well thought out and should be of great assistance in watching the watts and thereby adding to the earning power of the plant.

ARCHBISHOP BLENK.

Visits Lafayette—Endorses Steps Taken for Building New Church—Guest of Father Teurlings.

Lafayette had a distinguished visitor last Sunday in the person of Most Reverend James H. Blenk, Archbishop of New Orleans. After the blessing of the new convent school at Broussard, autos conveyed His Grace and accompanying friends to this city where Father Teurlings entertained them and also the trustees and committee on finance of St. John's church, Messrs. F. V. Mouton, P. Gerac, C. O. Mouton, E. C. Voorhies, J. Gilbert St. Julien, Jos. Colcomb, Fernand Mouton, J. A. Roy and J. E. Trahan.

The object of the Archbishop's visit was the confirmation of measures and means for the building of the new church. His Grace presided at the meeting of the board of directors and with words of praise and admiration commended the action taken, endorsed the plan of subscription and exemption in case of death, and urges the congregation to move onward. After the meeting an audience was given the colored people and their request to build a church of their own was discussed. They listened with delight to the promises extended to them and will work with renewed energy towards success.

The new brick church will be constructed on the same site as the present one and the Archbishop wishes that all the congregation will unite their efforts, and that with general co-operation, sufficient funds will soon be available to start work. Nearly all the neighboring priests came to pay their respects to the Archbishop and to see their confreres from New Orleans, and were entertained by Father Teurlings.
