However, special mention is due Mr. Young, as Bates, the butler, who has a splendid voice, a pleasing pose and impressive portrayal of this important part. His very appearance impresses one and inspires the thought that around his work hinges the success of the performance, and as the play progresses he more than convinces the audience of his ability to act the part.

Another character worthy of more than passing notice is that of Maran Devereaux, portrayed by Miss Martin. No more clever actress has been seen on the local stage for some time. Her work is more than pleasing by reason of the fact that it embodies that easy manner characteristic of a natural effort and attacks one by the seeming simplicity of her every movement.

The "Big Hog" Delusion.  
With the coming of cold weather will come the neighborhood gossip that John Smith killed a hog that dressed 450 pounds or Sam Jones killed one that dressed 475 pounds. In the ordinary course of pork-making with hogs that have not been used for breeding purposes, hogs of that size are no credit to the intelligence of their owners. The last hundred pounds made by such hogs probably cost three times as much as the first or second hundred pounds and is almost invariably made at a loss. If while the last 100 pounds is being made it is necessary to furnish feed to keep alive three or four hundred pounds it will certainly require more feed than if only 100 pounds had to be supported. No hog for pork-making has any business or right to live for more than 10 months or a year, or to weigh more than 225 to 300 pounds.—Starville (Miss.) Progressive Farmer and Gazette.

## ITEMS OF INTEREST OVER THE STATE

Col. Lansing H. Beach visited Lake Charles Wednesday to inspect the intercostal Canal from Calcasieu river to the Sabine, with a view to advertising for bids for its early construction.

Failure of the steering gear of an automobile precipitated three men and a woman into the old Basin Canal in New Orleans. The woman was drowned. It is the old story—drinks, fast ride and the inevitable crash.

It is reported that Associate Justice Francis T. Nichols, who has been ill for some time, will take advantage of the constitutional amendment recently adopted and retire. This will necessitate an election to fill the vacancy on the Supreme Bench.

The Hibernia Rabbit, the Christmas number of the magazine issued by the Hibernia Bank, tastefully decorated to mark the season of the year, contains a forerunner of the publicity that is to be given to the Torrens System of land registration, the establishment of which in Louisiana is to be sought by real estate and banking interests at the next session of the legislature.

The executive committee of the State Teachers' Association met in the office of the Superintendent of Education, at Baton Rouge, with the following members present: President and chairman ex officio, J. F. Welch; superintendent, T. H. Harris; J. W. McNeese, A. C. Lewis, J. O. Taylor, Miss Marion Brown and Nicholas Bauer, secretary. The date for the meeting of the association was fixed for April 6, 7 and 8. The meeting will take place in Lake Charles.

In the suit at Abbeville of Dr. A. C. Eustis vs. Dr. H. A. Eldridge in which Dr. Eustis sought to recover \$5000 for certain alleged slanderous remarks of Dr. Eldridge over the treatment of a case which in the first instance had been in the care of the defendant, Judge Wm.
