

Women on School Boards.

The next legislature will once more be asked to submit to the people of Louisiana a constitutional amendment providing that women shall be eligible to serve upon school boards. It is a matter, it seems to us, in which there should be absolutely no division of opinion.

The mother has practically entire supervision of bringing up the child and in the very nature of things it could not be otherwise. The father as bread winner is not able to give to the home training of the child that care and attention which the mother, always at home can give and does give.

Following this stage of the child's development—the home days—come the school days. Here it is the woman teacher, in perhaps ninety out of every hundred cases, that takes up the work of training the child from the point where the mother left off. To give the mothers no voice in the selection of these teachers who are a supplement to their own efforts at the home appeals to us as the very height of folly.

In a speech before the Louisiana Press Association at Lake Charles last week, Miss Kate Gordon, of New Orleans presented the cause of the women in Louisiana in most forceful manner and incidentally pointed out that the demands now being made are simply for a restoration of rights that were taken away from them by the constitutional convention of 1898. Prior to that time the state of Louisiana recognized the right of women to serve upon school boards as well as in many other public capacities.

Miss Gordon also pointed out some interesting facts concerning the progress made in states of the union which have given over to women the management of the school affairs. The remarkable announcement was made that the state of Colorado, which practically turns all of her school affairs over to the women spends more money per capita and gets more value for the money spent than any other state in the entire union.

On the other hand it is pointed out the states of the union in which there exists the greatest illiteracy are those states in which the women are denied any sort of participation in the school affairs. Louisiana's position is not an enviable one by any means.

The Journal believes if there is any sphere in which the genius and the energy and consecration of women should find active employment it is in the management of the public schools of the state and unhesitatingly commends to the general assembly the proposition to submit to the voters a proposal to so amend the constitution as to restore their rights in the premises.

How to Make Whitewash.

To make whitewash, slake half a bushel of fresh lime with boiling water, covering the barrel while slaking. Strain and add 12 peck of salt dissolved in warm water, ½ pound of whiting and 1 pound of glue dissolved in warm water. Let stand for several days and apply warm, if possible. Another recipe is to merely slack the lime and then add one pint of boiled linseed oil to each gallon of wash, or, if no oil is at hand, use melted tallow. This is for rough outside work only.—Starkville (Miss.) Progressive Farmer.

Grow More Peanuts.

The peanut is a legume rich in nitrogen, but gathers from the air a large part of this nitrogen. Our soils are generally deficient in nitrogen, and it is the most expensive of plant foods that we buy by the millions of dollars worth every year. The peanut furnishes good hay for cattle, and may save us millions of dollars in money now paid for roughage shipped in from other sections. The peanut is one of the best crops for producing pork cheaply. We now pay millions of dollars for pork which can be produced on peanuts for one half of what it now costs. The peanut brings a good price on the market because the demand has always exceeded the supply, and at 75 cents to \$1.00 per bushel is a money crop equal to cotton at ten to twelve cents per pound. The peanut—certain varieties—can be made in four months.

and is suitable for use as a catch crop after oats and wheat, in the part of the cotton belt which is best suited to its growth. Let us grow the peanut, but let the increase in acreage be sane and safe or of slow growth so that we may learn how to handle it to the best advantage.—Starkville (Miss.) Progressive Farmer.

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
