Southside School League.

In spite of the light showers Friday afternoon a well attended meeting of the Southside School League was held in the auditorium of the High School. The meeting was called to order by the president and after the routine business was conducted the subject of the public library was talked about. The chair appointed Mr. Dickerson, Mmes. Denbo, Guilbeau and Miss Brewer as a committee to draw up rules by which the library will be conducted. These rules will be submitted to the League before adoption. It was moved and carried that the committee on selecting books for the library be allowed one hundred dollars with which to purchase standard books. This committee is composed of Mr. Dickerson, Miss Edith Dupre and Mrs. Gordinier. It is the intention of the League to make another appropriation for books very shortly and all the members are working earnestly to make this public library as good as it can be made with a small beginning. MR. MICHEL'S LAND SPECULATIONS.

Natchitoches Enterprise:

The papers which are supporting Mr. Michel are making a brave effort to break the force of the confessed fact that while holding a State office he speculated in State lands to the extent of 57,000 acres.

With one voice they assert that there is absolutely nothing in the matter, that it is merely a desperate effort of his political opponents to injure him, and, in short, that the charge is too frivolous to merit serious attention.

Mr. Michel evidently does not agree with them, because he has already issued two lengthy and elaborate explanations and is liable to send forth another at any moment.

His defence is substantially: First, that he violated no law.

Second, that his official position gave him no power to fix the price of the land or the terms of the sale, but

that on the contrary he paid the price which was fixed by law.

Third, that the purchases were made openly and the evidences of them were duly registered on the public records of the land office at Baton Rouge, and

Fourth, that although a public official, he had the right to make money in this way if he saw fit to do so.

If the question at issue affected Mr. Michel's character as a private citizen or his integrity as a business man only there would be more force in the defence that he has kept within the bounds set by the statutes.

But, Mr. Michel is a candidate for the highest office within the power of the people of this State to bestow. An office which represents the majesty and power of the law, and the dignity, the virtue and intelligence of the commonwealth.

It ought to be filled by a man of whom something more can be said than that he has not offended against the written law. The great majority of men can probably say as much.

What are the man's ideals, his conceptions of public and private duty are questions of the highest importance in a case like this, because these things will give tone to and shape his course in the administration of his high office.

Is he broad-minded? Does he hold lofty views of the purposes and objects of the office he seeks? Does he believe that it will be his solemn duty to consecrate his life for four years to the unselfish service of his people? Or, is he narrow-minded and selfish? Does he regard public office as a sort of prize which a man wins? And will he use it to reap benefits for himself and his friends?

Mr. Michel's conduct in the matter at hand must suggest the answer to these questions.

There are laws which regulate the conduct of men in both public and private life which are far more universal and binding than those which legislatures enact. They are founded upon an intuitive knowledge of right and wrong.

And one of these is that the man who accepts high public office must give all of his energy and ability to the public service, and he must, therefore, abandon for the time his efforts to amass a fortune.
