### POLICE JURY.

Lafayette, La., Nov. 7, 1912.  
The Police Jury met this day in regular session with the following members present: Cornelius Spell, John Whittington, S. J. Breaux, E. U. Primeaux, Luke LeBlanc and F. O. Broussard.

Members absent, M. Billeaud, Jr., P. R. Landry, and Henri Gerac.  
In the absence of the president the secretary called the meeting to order, whereupon Mr. Spell was made president pro tem of the meeting.

The minutes of the meeting held on October 3, were read and approved.

Dr. A. J. Burkett of Milton presented the following petition, which was read:

To the Honorable President and Members of the Police Jury of the Parish of Lafayette and State of Louisiana:

We, the undersigned citizens and sugar cane growers of the aforesaid parish and State, and of the vicinity of Milton, La., do hereby respectfully petition your Hon. body to accept and open up for the uses and purposes of the travelling public as public road, the following described roads, and as described and traced out on the herewith attached diagram and map, to-wit: Commencing and intersecting the Youngville and Maurice road near Mitchell Breaux, running southward intersecting Grand North Avenue, to where it intersects Lamar Street, thence running westward to where it intersects Burkett street, thence running southward, crossing the Abbeville and Franklin railway, intersecting the Milton and Youngville road immediately opposite K. Comeaux's store, and thence northward on said Burkett street to where it intersects Denals street at Lolan's store, thence westward on said Denals street to where it intersects the Milton bayou road at Lolan's store.

Said and above described roads being partially accepted by a former Police Jury of said Parish and State, and the whole is already donated and recorded on the public records in the Clerk's Office in Lafayette with the exception of the right of way of the said Abbeville & Franklin Railway and also a strip of land ten feet wide owned by J. E. Bordeau, where there has been a fence erected to obstruct the passage of the traveling public; the balance of said road, as aforesaid, being already open and in daily use.

It was moved by LeBlanc and seconded by Primeaux that a committee of freeholders be appointed and be given full power to act in said matter. Pres. pro tem Spell, LeBlanc, Primeaux and Breaux voting for.  
Whittington and Broussard voting against, whereupon Mr. Primeaux appointed the following named persons on the jury of freeholders: A. J. Hebert, Robert Hebert, Eugene Landry, Joseph Breaux, Orestes Cade, Sr., and

Maxime Bourque.  
Mr. L. E. Perrin representing the U. S. Department of Agriculture appeared before the jury in behalf of an appropriation of \$250 to extend the work of the department in this parish.

Afternoon session, Mr. LeBlanc excused.  
Mr. Primeaux was authorized to have the Milton bridge scraped and painted in conjunction with the parish of Vermilion.

Assessor Albert Trahan presented an account of sixty-four dollars to the jury for a balance due him on the adding machine purchased of the the Burrough Adding Machine Co., September 2, 1909. Sec. Crouchet and Juror Broussard were instructed by the Chair to investigate the above account and if found correct to pay it.

A petition signed by about eighty citizens from the second ward was read in regard to appointing a jury of freeholders to trace out a public road in the second ward, whereupon Juror Spell appointed the following named persons on the jury of freeholder: Chas. Burke, John Nugent, Sr., Auguste Simon, Ursin Hoffpauir, Adam Clarke and Valery Boudreaux to trace a public road, forty feet wide, somewhere between Coulee Isle des Cannes and Ridge, in the second ward.

Police Juror Whittington reported the completion of the bridge on Coulee Isle des Cannes in the eighth ward. Report accepted.

Mr. Phineas Hoffpauir turned over fifteen dollars to the secretary to be deposited to the credit of the second ward special fund, for road work done for Dr. A. O. Clark by the ward's team.

Secretary Crouchet reported that he had made a settlement in full for the Traction engine, grader and three way-drag, he also acknowledged receipt of the appropriation of the city council of Lafayette in the sum of one thousand dollars, for the purchase of the road outfit.

Secretary Crouchet was authorized to issue warrants to the commissioners and clerks who served as such at the presidential election on November 5 for one day (three dollars) except the 3rd ward, Court House, precinct for two days at three dollars a day.

### FORUM ORGANIZED.

The Lafayette Forum has now completed its organization with the following list of officials and members of committees appointed by the President: E. L. Stephens, president, Mrs. A. B. Denbo vice-president, Miss Edith Dupre, secretary-manager, William Clegg, treasurer, William Campbell, Mrs. F. E. Davis, P. L. DeClouet, Mrs. E. R. Kennedy, N. P. Moss, Mrs. J. E. Nusz, and Mrs. R. D. Voorhies, Directors: Finance Committee, N. P. Moss, William Campbell, Mrs. N. Abramson; Hall Committee, F. E. Voorhies, Mrs. H. L. Ducrocq, Mrs. J. E. Nusz; Program Committee, (Music Mrs. Alfred Mouton, Miss E. B. Jones, F. V. Mouton; (Forensic), L. J. Alleman, J. J. Fournet, Miss Edith Dupre. It has been decided to hold meetings at 4 o'clock each Sunday afternoon, beginning next Sunday, November 17. A budget of \$400 for the season of 1912-13 has been adopted. The following article of the Constitution on the Object of the Forum was unanimously adopted: "Its objects shall be to associate together those interested in social and civic culture by providing for the benefit of the general public lectures and addresses on civic economic, social literary, philosophical and ethical themes, together with high class musical attractions. It is to be non-sectarian and non-partisan, and to serve as a clearing-house of public opinion upon all activities towards civic and social progress." The financial maintenance of the Forum will come from memberships, patronages, and life-memberships; members pay \$3 a year, patrons pay \$25 a year, and life members are those who give the Forum as much as \$100 at any one time. 48 members have already subscribed from among those who attended the preliminary meetings, and as only 133 members will be necessary at \$3 each to raise the \$400 budgeted for this season, it is practically certain that there will be no deficit. All meetings of the Forum are free to the public, and everybody is cordially invited to attend, whether he becomes a member or not. The program next Sunday will include an attractive concert by local musicians and a symposium of discussions by a number of gentlemen upon the subject of woman. The ladies will at the next meeting be given a chance to discuss the subject of Man. Among the gentlemen who will discuss Woman next Sunday are Major DeClouet, Judge Campbell, Mr. Kennedy, Dr. Ducrocq, Dr. Clark, Dr. Moss, and Dr. Stephens.

### FORUM PROGRAM.

For Meeting Sunday Afternoon in Music Hall—Music and Discussion—Everybody invited.

The Forum will present its first program to the public at Music Hall on Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock—beginning promptly on the minute. The musical program will be given first, and is to be as follows: Overture, "Ormand", by the Lafayette Concert Band, Vocal Solo by Miss Elece Shackford, accompanied on piano by Miss Isabelle Mouton; piano solo, Gottschalk's "Last Hope", by Miss Gertrude Mouton; Vocal Duet, Mendelssohn's "Farewell", by Misses Alice Campbell and Isabelle Mouton; Band Selection, "The Sea Breeze", by the Lafayette Concert Band. The forensic program to follow is to be on the subject of Woman—discussed by man—as follows: Dr. Ducrocq, 10 minutes; Judge Campbell 10 minutes; Dr. Moss, 10 minutes; Mr. Clegg, 3 minutes; Dr. Stephens, 2 minutes; Mr. F. E. Voorhies, 5 minutes; Mr. Kennedy 10 minutes; Major DeClouet 10 minutes. As the total time of this symposium is limited to one hour, the speakers will be limited strictly within the periods of time scheduled for them. Admission to the hall is free to all and the public cordially invited.
