Notice is further given that the city council of the city of Lafayette, will, in open session to be held at four o'clock p. m., at the city hall in said city on Saturday, May 31st, 1913, proceed to open the ballot boxes, examine and count the ballots, in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns, and declare the result of said election.

**AN ORDINANCE** calling a special election in accordance with and under the provisions of act No. 256 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, of the year 1910, approved July 7th, 1910, as amended by act No. 218 of the General Assembly of the state of Louisiana, approved July 7th, 1912, for the purpose of taking the sense of the property tax payers of the City of Lafayette, parish of Lafayette, State of Louisiana, authorized and entitled to vote under the constitution and laws of said State, to levy a special tax of ONE mill on all the property subject to state taxation in said city, for the period of twenty-five years beginning with the year 1913 and extending to and including the year 1937, for the purpose of constructing and maintaining public roads and bridges within the territorial limits of the parish of Lafayette, said tax not to be funded into bonds; and also to incur a debt of seventy-five thousand dollars, and issue negotiable bonds therefor to the amount of Seventy-five thousand dollars, said bonds to run twenty-five years bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, the object of which the debt is to be incurred and bonds issued being for the construction and maintenance of public roads and bridges within the territorial limits of said parish of Lafayette, the City Council of the City of Lafayette to impose and collect annually in excess of all taxes, a tax sufficient to pay the interest, semi-annually, and the principal falling due each year, or such amount as may be required for any sinking fund necessary to retire said bonds at maturity, in the manner, and as authorized by said act No. 256 of 1910 and the constitution of this State, Articles 232, 281, and 281, and the enabling acts thereunder.

Section 1. BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Lafayette, in regular session assembled, that a special election be and is hereby ordered and called to be held in said city, to be held at the Court House from seven o'clock a. m. to five o'clock p. m., on Tuesday, the twenty-seventh day of May, A. D. nineteen hundred and thirteen, at which election shall be submitted to the property tax payers of the said city of Lafayette entitled to vote and qualified as electors under the constitution and laws of this State, the following proposition:

1st. To levy a special tax of ONE mill on all the property subject to State taxation in the City of Lafayette, Louisiana, for the period of twenty-five years, beginning with the year 1913, and extending to and including the year 1937, for the purpose of constructing and maintaining public roads and bridges within the territorial limits of the parish of Lafayette, State of Louisiana; and

2nd. To incur debt and issue bonds of the City of Lafayette, State of Louisiana, to the amount of Seventy-five thousand dollars to run twenty-five years, bearing interest at the rate of five per centum per annum, interest payable semi-annually, for the purpose of constructing and maintaining the public roads and bridges within the territorial limits of the parish of Lafayette, State of Louisiana.

Section 2. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, etc. That notice of said election shall be proclaimed by the Mayor of the City of Lafayette, the

proclamation to embrace substantially all things that are required to be set therein, and further that the City Council will, in open session to be held on Saturday, the thirty-first day of May, at the City Hall at four o'clock p. m., proceed to open the ballot boxes, examine and count the ballots, in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns, and declare the result of the election; which notice shall be advertised for thirty days in the Lafayette Gazette, the official paper of the City of Lafayette.

Section 3. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, etc. That Isaac B. Bendel, Felix H. Mouton and Clifton I. Young, registered voters of the City of Lafayette Louisiana, be and are hereby appointed commissioners, and Robert H. Broussard, clerk of election to hold said election.

Section 4. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, etc. That the ballots to be used at said election shall be in the following form:

Section 5. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, etc. That the City Council of the City of Lafayette, Louisiana, shall, if the majority of the property tax payers in number and amount, voting at said election, vote in favor of either or both propositions herein submitted, levy and collect annually, beginning with the year 1913, extending to and including the year 1937, in excess of all taxes, a tax sufficient to pay the interest, semi-annually, and the principal, of said negotiable bonds falling due each year, or such amount as may be required for any sinking fund necessary to retire said bonds at maturity, by ordinance, and in all respects as provided by law, and shall levy and collect the tax in excess of all other taxes voted for, and not funded into bonds, if voted for as
