CHARTER

—of the—
SOUTHWEST LOUISIANA DEVELOPMENT BUREAU.

United States of America,
State of Louisiana,
Parish of Lafayette.

For the formation of a corporation under the laws of the State of Louisiana, (Act No. 53 of General Assembly, State of Louisiana, for the year 1902) for the assistance and advancement of the material interests of the state in general and in particular those of Southwest Louisiana, we, the undersigned citizens of the parishes of Beauregard, Calcasieu, Cameron, Allen, Jefferson Davis, Evangeline, Acadia, St. Landry, Lafayette, Vermillion, St. Martin, Iberia, and St. Mary, all within and of the said State of Louisiana, do hereby agree upon and bind ourselves by the following articles of association:

ARTICLE I.

The name and title of this association shall be, Southwest Louisiana Development Bureau; it shall have its domicile at Lafayette, La., but the annual meeting of the organization may be held at such place in the district as may be determined upon by the board of directors; it shall enjoy succession by its corporate name for a period of 99 years. The corporation shall have the power to contract, to sue and defend suits; to buy, hold, and sell, lease and hypothecate property, real or personal, and to perform all acts or functions necessary for the accomplishment of the purposes herein set forth.

ARTICLE II.

The objects of this corporation are declared to be the promotion of the agricultural, commercial, social, and general welfare of the parishes above mentioned and of the State of Louisiana in general.

ARTICLE III.

Citations may be served upon the President, or in his absence, upon the Secretary or the Treasurer of the corporation.

ARTICLE IV.

Membership in this corporation shall be as follows:

(a) Active memberships; any reputable individual, copartnership, or corporation whose legal residence or domicile is within the confines of the district above outlined shall be eligible to active membership upon subscribing \$10.00 per annum to the support of the bureau; and any other non profit sharing association domiciled within the district shall be entitled to as many memberships as its total subscription shall warrant, each \$10.00 of its subscription to count for one membership. Active members shall be entitled to vote at all general elections for the selection of officers and the determination of the policies

of this association; upon petition of 5 per cent of this membership the president shall call special elections. No proxies shall ever be voted either in general or special elections.

(b) Associate Memberships: Any citizen of the above mentioned parishes, of good moral character, shall be eligible to associate membership, and shall be enrolled as such upon sending to the secretary a letter promising to "Boost." The enclosure of One Dollar with application shall entitle an associate member to the receipt by mail of all the official publications of the corporation including all statements of account and expenditure.

(c) Honorary Memberships: Subject to the approval of the board of directors, individuals, firms and corporations doing some proportion of their business within the district or for any reason interested in its development, shall be eligible to honorary membership, and entitled to registration as such upon their payment of \$25.00 annually into the treasury of the bureau; all official publications of the corporation shall be mailed to them.

ARTICLE V.

The officers of this corporation shall be a president, thirteen vice-presidents, one from each parish, a secretary, a treasurer and a board of directors, of which the above officers shall be ex-officio members. These officers shall be chosen in convention called for the purpose of perfecting this organization, Aug. 6 and 7, to serve until the first Wednesday of October, 1914, or until their successors are elected and thereafter annually as follows:

The president, secretary and treasurer shall be elected at the annual meeting by a majority vote of the Active Members present and voting; provided that any active member unable to be present in person may file notice of his choice in writing with the secretary, and such notice shall be counted by the tellers as one vote for one candidate named for each office, and for no other.

The vice-president shall be nominated by the active members of each parish voting in caucus at the time of the general election. In addition to the vice-presidents, each parish shall be entitled to two members of the board of directors, one of whom shall be elected at the same time and in the same manner as the vice presidents, the other to be nominated by the police jury.

Each transportation company directly serving the district shall be entitled to the appointment of one member of the board of directors, and shall in consideration thereof pay annually into the treasury of the bureau a sum to be determined by the board of directors of this organization.

The board of directors shall have the power to enact all necessary by-laws for the government, control and administration of this corporation and to amend the same at pleasure.

ARTICLE VI.

The active management of the affairs of the bureau shall be vested in the board of directors, thirteen of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. They may employ, with the title of manager, a competent man, trained in community development work, to whom they may delegate any executive powers in them legally vested and they may furnish him with such clerical and other assistance as may be necessary. They shall determine the compensation of all employees, and what proportion of the bureau's income shall be devoted to each phase of work undertaken.

ARTICLE VII.

A careful accounting of all financial transactions of the bureau shall be made semi-annually and a carefully compiled statement of same mailed to all members of every class. All fiduciary officers of this corporation shall be bonded in such sum as may be fixed by the board of directors.

ARTICLE VIII.

This act of incorporation may be altered or amended by a vote of a majority of the active members present and voting at a meeting called for that purpose. A ten days' written notice of such a meeting shall be given to each member.

In case of dissolution by limitation or otherwise, the affairs of this corporation shall be liquidated by thirteen commissioners, who shall be selected from those members in good standing present at a meeting called for that purpose, provided that they may be selected at the meeting decreeing liquidation. Notice of such meeting shall be the same as provided for Amendment to Charter.

ARTICLE IX.

No member shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contracts, faults or debts of this corporation in any further sum than the unpaid balance of his annual fee; nor shall any mere informality in its organization have the effect of rendering this charter

null or of exposing liability beyond the unpaid dues.

ARTICLE X.

Political or sectarian questions shall be forever debarred from consideration or discussion in this bureau.
