Suggestions by Committee of Farmers Marketing Association-Everybody invited to Join in.

"Irish potatoes should be planted from January 10th, to 25th. In order which reductions are asked. to get them in time for best market it is necessary that they be planted at this time, and that the ground be put in first class condition and well drained before planting.

"We recommend planting an early variety, such as Triumph, Early Rose, or Cobler. The other varieties mature too late to get the best prices

"In order to have them mature early, it is necessary that some form of commercial fertilizer be used and we recommend 300 pounds of cotton seed meal and 200 pounds of acid phosphate on the average soil per acre. This will assure a good yield and cause them to mature sooner.

"The main point to work to is to have Irish potatoes ready for market between April 15th and May 1st. By putting them on the market at this date, we can safely figure on one dollar per bushel net."
