secretary having compiled with said motion, under direction of the council, read to it the compiled statement made by the said commissioners and clerk of the said election and submitted for the inspection of the council the said tally sheet of said election and read to it the oath of the commissioners and clerk; and after having ascertained that six hundred and five vote had been cast at said election, of which three hundred and twenty-four votes had been cast in favor of the proposition to organize the city of Lafayette under provisions of act No. 207 of 1912, two hundred and seventy-eight votes had been cast against the said proposition and three ballots spoiled and not counted, it was moved, seconded and carried that the said compiled statement be filed and preserved in the records of the city.

And the city council after inspection of the said tally sheet and triplicate list of voters having ascertained that the votes cast for and against were the same as carried on the said tally sheet, the same was also ordered filed and preserved in the records of the city.

Whereupon, it was moved, by Debailon, duly seconded and carried that the envelope containing the compiled statement and proclamation made by the Board of Supervisors of Election of the election held as aforesaid, be opened by the secretary; and the secretary having complied with the said instructions the same was read to the council and on motion duly seconded and carried the same was ordered spread on the minutes; the said compiled statement and proclamation being in the words and figures following, to-wit:

Compiled statement of votes cast in favor of and against the proposition submitted to the qualified electors of the city of Lafayette, La., on Feb. 11th, 1914, as to "WHETHER OR NOT THE CITY OF LAFAYETTE SHALL BE ORGANIZED UNDER ACT NO. 207 OF 1912 OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF LOUISIANA.

Total number of votes cast Six Hundred and Five.

BE IT KNOWN that on this Thirteenth day of February, A. D., nineteen hundred and fourteen, we, the undersigned members of the Board of Supervisors of Election of the parish of Lafayette, repaired to the Court House of said parish, and there, in the presence of Albert Trahan, J. Aymar Labbe and Felix M. Latiola's three voters, and as many others as desired to be present do hereby make a true compiled statement as shown by the face of the sworn returns of the Commissioners of Election and result of the election held in the City of Lafayette on Feb. 11th, 1914, in accordance with the notice of election issued by this Board and by proclamation of the Mayor of the city of Lafayette, La., to be held on said day and date, on the proposition to organize the city of Lafayette under act No. 207 of 1912 of the general assembly; and do hereby make public proclamation of such result, as shown by the face of the sworn returns aforesaid, as follows, to-wit:

Three Hundred and Twenty-Four (324) voter in favor of the proposition to organize the city of Lafayette under act No. 207 of 1912 of the General Assembly.

Two Hundred and Seventy-Eight (278) votes against the proposition to organize the city of Lafayette under act No. 207 of 1912 of the General Assembly.

Three (3) ballots spoiled.

One of the said compiled statements to be forwarded to the Secretary of State, one to the clerk of the District Court, one to the Mayor of

A special meeting of the City Council was held this day with Mayor G. A. Martin presiding, Messrs. Debailon, Delhomme, Doucet, Jeanmard, Krauss and Montgomery present and none absent.

The mayor stated to the council that this was a special meeting called for the purpose stated in the written call which he then submitted to the council and read by the secretary as follows:

Lafayette, La., Feb. 13, 1914.
Mr. Councilman.

You are hereby notified that a special meeting of the City Council will be held this evening at seven thirty o'clock for the purpose of considering and accepting the following to-wit:

FIRST: To receive the report on the election held in this City on Wednesday, February 11, 1914, from the Commissioners and Clerk of Election and from the Board of Supervisors of Election, to adopt such motions, resolutions and ordinances as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of act No. 207 of 1912 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, and to do such things as shall be necessary to carry out the said provisions.

SECONDLY: To consider the request of Anderson Offutt, contractor of the water and light plant for the city of Lafayette to have certain payments made to him; to consider advices received from him to the effect that unless such payments are made to him that he shall take such proceedings as shall be necessary to prevent the city from using the generators, dynamos, and air compressors installed by him. (In this connection we desire to state that should he succeed in doing so the city will be unable to furnish WATER and light to its patrons.)
