Lafayette, La., Feb. 21, 1914. A special meeting of the city council was held this day with Mayor Martin presiding and Councilmen Debailion, Delhomme, Doucet, Jeanmard, Montgomery and Krauss present and none absent.

The mayor stated to the council that this was a special meeting called for the purpose stated in the written call which was then submitted to the council and read by the secretary as follows:

Lafayette, La., Feb. 20, 1914. We, the undersigned mayor and members of the city council of the city of Lafayette, Louisiana, do hereby accept service of notice to be present at a special meeting of the city council to be held Saturday morning, Feb. 21, 1914, at the hour of eleven thirty o'clock for the purpose of considering the decision rendered by the City Court of the City of Lafayette, Louisiana, in the case of the city of Lafayette vs. Mayo Besson and Edward Hebert, for violation of the ordinance adopted by said mayor and city council prohibiting gambling in said city; and whether or not an appeal should be taken by the city in said case; and to do and perform such acts, adopt such motions, and enact such ordinances as may be necessary to perfect the said appeal, should one be decided upon.

The mayor explained that this was a special meeting of the council called for the purpose of considering matters pertaining to the construction of the proposed cement walks.

Whereupon the following resolution was introduced:

Be it resolved by the Mayor and members of the city council in special session assembled, that the Aberdeen Cement Company be granted an extension of ten days from Feb. 27, 1914, in which to furnish satisfactory bonds, provided by the specifications and the law, under the contract with the city to be entered into under its bid; provided said bidder shall agree that this extension shall not in any way affect its obligations under said bid, for not furnishing said bonds as provided for by law and the specifications under which the bid was made.

Mayor's Proclamation.  
STATE OF LOUISIANA,  
PARISH OF LAFAYETTE,  
CITY OF LAFAYETTE.

KNOW ALL MEN, by these presents, that whereas, an election was held in the city of Lafayette Louisiana on the eleventh day of February A. D. nineteen hundred and fourteen, submitting to the electors of said city the following proposition: "Shall the proposition to organize the City of Lafayette under act No. 207 of 1912, of the General Assembly, be adopted," and

Whereas, the compiled statement and tally sheet made by the Commissioners and Clerk of the said election and the compiled statement and public proclamation of the result of said election made by the Board of Supervisors of Election of the parish of Lafayette, Louisiana, copies of which have been filed with the Mayor of the city of Lafayette, Louisiana, as provided by law, showing that six hundred and five votes were cast at the said election of which three hundred and twenty four votes were cast in favor of the said proposition, two hundred and seventy-eight votes cast against the said proposition, and three ballots were spoiled and not counted, and showing further that a majority of the electors of the city of Lafayette, La., have voted in favor of organizing the city of Lafayette under act No. 207 of 1912; and

Whereas, the said compiled statement, tally sheet and list of voters made by the said Commissioners and the said compiled statement and public proclamation made by the said Board of Supervisors, turned over, as aforesaid, to the Mayor of the City of Lafayette, La., were by him turned over to the City Council of said city meeting in special session on the fifteenth day of February, 1913, cognizance whereof was taken by said body at said meeting, as shown by the minutes thereof and particularly by the adoption of AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE DECLARING THE RESULT OF THE ELECTION HELD IN THE CITY OF LAFAYETTE, LOUISIANA, ON THE ELEVENTH DAY OF FEBRUARY, A. D. NINETEEN HUNDRED AND FOURTEEN, SUBMITTING TO THE ELECTORS OF SAID CITY THE FOLLOWING PROPOSITION:

"SHALL THE PROPOSITION TO ORGANIZE THE CITY OF LAFAYETTE UNDER ACT NO. 207 OF 1912, OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY BE ADOPTED," AND DIRECTING AND AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR OF THE CITY OF LAFAYETTE TO ISSUE HIS PROCLAMATION DECLARING THE RESULT THEREOF"; and

Whereas, under Section three of the said ordinance the Mayor of the city of Lafayette, La., is directed and authorized to issue public proclamation under seal of the city of Lafayette declaring the result of said election and that the city of Lafayette shall, after the expiration of the terms of its incumbent officers, be governed under the provisions of act No. 207 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, for the year 1912.

NOW THEREFORE, by virtue of the authority vested in me by law and by virtue of the authority granted me under the provisions of the said ordinance, public proclamation is hereby made of the result of the said election, as hereinabove shown, and that cognizance is hereby taken of the said election and that a majority of the electors of the city of Lafayette, La., have adopted the proposition to organize the city of Lafayette, Louisiana, under act No. 207 of 1912, of the General Assembly.

IT IS FURTHER PROCLAIMED, that the city of Lafayette, Louisiana, shall proceed to the election of a mayor and two councilmen at the first regular city election taking place, and quadriennially thereafter, and shall thereafter, that is after said election of the Mayor and City Council, be governed as provided in said act No. 207 of 1912, under the powers belonging to said city, conferred either by its charter, or by law not inconsistent with, contrary to, or in conflict with the provisions of said act, and without impairment of any exemption from the payment of parish taxes, as now provided by the charter of the city of Lafayette, Louisiana; provided that the provisions of said act shall not become effective until the terms of the incumbent mayor and members of the city council of said city shall have expired.
