Paul E. Schwitzer, who was the organizer of the Southwest Development Bureau, has been added to the working force of the bureau. This was done by the Board of Directors after hearing the quarterly report of Manager W. C. Chevis, who advised that Mr. Schwitzer be employed until the work be caught up with or so long as it might be deemed necessary. Mr. Schwitzer has proven himself a man of fine ability and his part in the foundation of this bureau makes it a matter of congratulation that it will be possible to keep him here in the work.

The bureau is a great thing for all Southwest Louisiana and a tremendous potential for developing the immense resources of the thirteenth parishes embraced in the Bureau's activity.

What Louisiana and this particular part of it has needed and now needs is a directing head to point the lines along which it is most practicable to start and gradually widen the scope as the conditions become propitious. This the Bureau with its splendid force is doing, and its work will not alone urge the development of the section but will draw attention to it from all quarters. Indeed part of the Bureau's work is now in the line of attracting the attention of the rest of the country to what these Louisiana parishes are doing and can do.

Naturally such upbuilding work does not present phenomenal incidents, strewing the days with sparks of brilliants to light up the heavens, but it does surely and continually lay the foundations deep for a development and improvement that some day will burst upon our consciousness as a discovery that some force has changed things in Southwest Louisiana and made it par excellence a place to live in and prosper in and enjoy life. With the right support the Bureau will make this happen and at no greatly distant date.

Amendment to Charter.

At a regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Peoples Cotton Oil Company, Ltd., held Tuesday, April 7, 1914, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved that Article Four of the Charter be amended so as to read as follows:

"Said corporation shall be managed by a board of five to nine directors at the discretion of the stockholders, and who shall be citizens of this state and actual stockholders, and shall be elected by ballot on the first Tuesday of June of each year, and said board shall hold office for one year or until their successors are elected and qualified. All elections shall be conducted under the supervision of three stockholders to be appointed by the board of directors for that purpose, and in case of anyone so appointed declining or failing to act, the President shall appoint another to fill his place. The stockholders at the annual meeting shall first determine the number of directors to be elected, and such number receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. The said board shall elect from their number a president, a vice-president who may also serve as treasurer, and the salary of the general manager and secretary and treasurer shall be fixed by the board. The board of directors shall have power to fill all vacancies occurring on the same."

Resolved further that this proposed amendment to the charter be published for thirty days in a weekly newspaper published in the city of Lafayette, La., and then submitted to the stockholders at a special meeting which is hereby called to be held at the office of the company in Lafayette, La., on Tuesday, May 19, 1914, at 2:30 p. m. and in the event the same receives the assent of three-fourths of the capital stock of this corporation the same shall become a part of the charter and take the place of Article Four as it now appears, and moreover that a copy of the same be duly recorded in the clerk's office in the parish of Lafayette and also in the office of the Secretary of State at Baton Rouge.

CHARTER

BE IT KNOWN, That on this THIRTY-FIRST DAY OF THE MONTH OF MARCH, in the year of our Lord, ONE THOUSAND, NINE HUNDRED AND FOURTEEN (1914) before me, JEROME MOUTON, a Notary Public, duly commissioned and qualified, in and for the Parish of Lafayette, State of Louisiana, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned:

PERSONALLY CAME AND APPEARED the persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, who severally declared that availing themselves of the provisions of an act of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, known as Number 36, of the Session of the year 1888, as well as of the general laws of this state governing the formation of corporations in general, they do, by these presents, covenant, agree and bind themselves, as well as such other persons as may hereafter become associated with them, in order to form and constitute a corporation or body-politic in law for the objects and purposes under the stipulations, following to-wit:

ARTICLE I

The name and title of this corporation shall be the **LUKE LeBLANC LUMBER COMPANY, LIMITED**; and it shall have and enjoy succession and existence for a period of ninety-nine (99) years from the date hereof. It shall have the power to contract, to sue and be sued in its corporate name, to make and use a corporate seal, and make, break and alter the same at pleasure; to hold, purchase, lease, sell, mortgage, or hypothecate property, real, personal and mixed, or mortgage security or other security; to name, elect, appoint managers, directors and agents, and to make and establish such by-laws, rules, and regulations as may be necessary for its proper management.

ARTICLE II

The domicile of this corporation, and its principal office for the transaction of business, shall be in the Village of Scott, Parish of Lafayette, State of Louisiana, and it shall have the right to transact business in the Parish of Lafayette or elsewhere as deemed proper.

The president, or in his absence, the vice-president, shall be the officer upon whom citation or other judicial process shall be served.

ARTICLE III

The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of **TEN THOUSAND (\$10,000.00) DOL-**



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LARS, and this charter shall be operative, and go into effect and the said corporation shall become a going concern when the sum of FIVE THOUSAND (\$5000.00) DOLLARS shall have been subscribed.

The capital stock of this corporation shall be divided into one hundred (100) shares of the par value of ONE HUNDRED (\$100.00) dollars per share, and shall be paid for in cash, or its equivalent, in real estate, mill property, timber land, lumber, logs, notes, bonds, or mortgages, or any other property which the Board of Directors may approve.

ARTICLE IV

The objects and purposes of this corporation, and the nature of the business to be carried on by it, are hereby declared to be: to do a general lumber and manufacturing and general merchandise business: to own and operate lumber yards, sawmills, shingle and planing mills, sash, door and blind factories, and other manufactories; also railroads, pail-boats and steam-boats; to make contracts for the sale of lumber, shingles, etc., and for the purchase of logs and timber; to own and operate lumber yards, and in fact to do any and all things, necessary and proper to the carrying out of its business.

ARTICLE V

The business of this corporation shall be directed by and vested in a Board of Directors, composed of three stockholders, each owning one or more shares of stock. Said Directors shall be elected at a general meeting of the stockholders convened for that purpose on the first Monday of April in each year, and each share of stock present or represented shall be entitled to one vote. The election shall be held at the principal office of this corporation after ten (10) days' notice to each stockholder. A failure to hold an election on the date specified shall not dissolve the corporation, but the directors in office shall hold their respective offices until the election be subsequently held, after ten days' notice of the time and place thereof.

All vacancies in the said Board of Directors from any cause shall be filled by the remaining directors. All meetings above set forth shall be called on not less than ten days' notice published in a newspaper published in the parish of Lafayette, Louisiana.

The Board of Directors shall elect a President, a Vice-president and Secretary-Treasurer. The majority of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE VI

No stockholder shall be liable or responsible for the contracts, faults or debts of this corporation in any further sum than the unpaid balance due the corporation on the shares of stock owned by him; nor shall any informality in organization have the effect of rendering this charter null, or of exposing a stockholder to any liability beyond the amount of his stock.

ARTICLE VII

This act of incorporation may be amended, altered or modified or this corporation dissolved by a vote of three-fourths (3/4) of the shares of the total amount of the stock, at a meeting held for that purpose after ten days' notice in writing is mailed to each stockholder at his address.

ARTICLE VIII

At the expiration of this charter or at its dissolution, the affairs of this corporation shall be liquidated by the Board of Directors, who are hereby vested to sell any and all assets of the corporation, and to convey full and complete title thereto and who shall have the full power to do and perform all acts necessary and proper to liquidate, fully and completely, the affairs of the corporation and distribute the proceeds, if any, among the shareholders to the amount of the stock held by each.

ARTICLE IX

The following persons shall constitute the first Board of Directors: **LUKE LeBLANC, GEORGE J. LeBLANC and PAUL G. LeBOURGEOIS**; who shall hold their offices until the first Monday of April, 1915, or until their successors are elected and qualified. **LUKE LeBLANC** shall be the President of this corporation, **GEORGE J. LeBLANC** its Vice-President, and **P. G. LeBOURGEOIS** its Secretary-Treasurer, from its organization until the first Monday of April, 1915, when their successors shall be elected as herein provided for.

ARTICLE X

The stock of this corporation is transferable only upon its books.

ARTICLE XI

The original list of subscribers to the capital stock of this corporation, giving their names, their addresses, and the amount of stock subscribed by each is annexed to this act and identified herewith.

Thus done and passed at my office in the Parish of Lafayette, Louisiana, on the day, month and year first above written, in the presence of two

witnesses, who hereto subscribe their names with appearers and me, Notary Public, after due reading of the whole.
