## CHARTER OF THE GARYVILLE REALTY COMPANY LIMITED.

STATE OF LOUISIANA,  
PARISH OF JEFFERSON.

BE IT KNOWN, That on this ninth  
day of the Month of February, in the  
year of Our Lord One Thousand Nine  
Hundred and Fourteen, and of the In-  
dependence of the United States of  
America, the One hundred and thirty-  
eight.

Before me, FREDERICK A. MID-  
DLETON, a Notary Public in and for  
the Parish of Jefferson, duly sworn,  
commissioned and qualified, and in the  
presence of the witnesses hereinafter-  
named and undersigned, personally  
came and appeared:

SIDNEY H. LABICHE, JOSEPH D.  
BROWN EMILE J. HEBERT and  
ARTHUR LABICHE, all of lawful age  
and residents of the Town of Garyville,  
Parish of St. John the Baptist, State of  
Louisiana, who declared to me, Notary,  
in the presence of the undersigned  
witnesses, that, availing themselves of  
of the provisions of the laws of this State  
relative to Corporations, they covenant  
and agree, and bind themselves, as well  
as such other persons as may hereafter  
become associated with them, to form  
and constitute a Corporation and body  
politic in law, for the purposes, objects,  
stipulations, articles and conditions, to-  
wit:

### ARTICLE I

The name and title of this corporation  
shall be the GARYVILLE REALTY  
COMPANY, LIMITED, and its domi-  
cile is hereby established in the Town of  
Garyville, Parish of St. John the Bap-  
tist, and under its said corporate name  
said corporation shall have power and  
authority to contract, sue and be sued;  
to make and use a corporate seal, and  
the same to break or alter at pleasure.  
to hold, receive, have, purchase improve,  
alienate, convey, sell, operate, pledge,  
mortgage, and hypothecate under its  
said corporate name, property real, per-  
sonal and mixed; to name and appoint  
such officers, directors, agents, managers  
and employes as the interest or con-  
venience of said Corporation may re-  
quire; to make and establish by laws  
rules and regulations for the proper  
management of its affairs as may be  
due, necessary and proper, and the  
same to change or alter at pleasure; and  
to do all and every act and thing per-  
mitted by law, or as shall or may be  
necessary and proper to carry out the  
objects and purposes of said corporation.

The said Corporation, unless sooner  
dissolved in accordance with its charter,  
shall exist and continue for a period of  
ninety-nine years from and after date  
hereof.

The President or in his absence, the  
Secretary-Treasurer, shall be the proper  
person upon whom citation or other  
legal process shall be served.

### ARTICLE II

The objects and purposes for which  
this corporation is organized, and the  
nature of the business to be carried on  
by it, are declared to be the following  
to wit:

To buy and sell real estate, on com-  
mission or for its own uses; to build  
houses for its own uses or for sale to buy  
and sell mortgage notes or other com-  
mercial paper, and generally to conduct  
a real estate business, and to do all  
things pertinent thereto.

### ARTICLE III

The capital stock of this corporation  
shall be Three thousand (\$3000.00)  
dollars, divided into and represented by  
thirty shares of the par value of One  
Hundred (\$100.00) dollars each, which  
said stock shall be paid for in cash, or  
same may be issued at not less than par,  
in payment or exchange for property or  
rights actually received or purchased by  
said corporation, and the same may be  
issued full paid for money paid, or for  
such other values or services as the  
Board of Directors of said corporation  
shall determine.

Any stockholder may sell or transfer  
his stock in this corporation, provided  
thirty days prior notice of such inten-  
tion to sell on transfer the same shall be  
given to the Company, and the other  
stockholders thereof shall have the first  
privilege of purchasing same; after  
which thirty days notice, the said stock  
may be sold in open market. The stock  
of said corporation may be transferred  
under the above provisions, provided  
such transfer thereof be made on the  
books of the Company, at its office, and  
on the surrender of the certificate there-  
for.

This corporation shall commence do-  
ing business as soon as  
Three thousand (\$3000.00)  
dollars of the capital stock shall have  
been subscribed for and fifty per cent of  
said subscription shall have been paid  
in cash.

### ARTICLE IV

The corporate powers of this company  
shall be vested in and exercised by a  
Board of four Directors consisting of the  
President, Vice-President, Secretary,  
Treasurer and one stockholder. Three of  
said Board shall constitute a quorum  
for the transaction of business. The fol-  
lowing shall constitute the first Board  
of Directors: Emile J. Hebert, President  
Joseph D. Brown, Vice President,  
Sidney H. Labiche, Secretary and  
Arthur Labiche.

No person shall be eligible as a  
Director who is not a stockholder of this  
corporation. This Board shall continue  
in office until the ninth day of February  
1915, on which date and annually there-  
after, on the ninth day of February, the  
Board Directors shall be elected each  
year. Notice of such election shall be  
given by registered letter directed by  
the Secretary-Treasurer to each of the  
stockholders of the corporation. Any  
failure, from any cause whatsoever, to  
elect Directors on the day named for  
that purpose, shall not dissolve the cor-  
poration, but the Directors then in office  
shall hold over until their successors are  
chosen. At every election and meeting  
each stockholder shall be entitled to  
vote for each share of stock registered  
in his name upon the books of the cor-  
poration, and may vote by proxy. The  
election of the Board of Directors shall  
be by ballot.

### ARTICLE V

The Board of Directors shall have full  
power to fill vacancies caused by death,  
resignations or otherwise, from among  
the stockholders of said corporation.  
Said Board shall have full control of the  
property of this Company, and shall so  
conduct, manage and use the same, as  
in their discretion they may deem fit,  
and that is consistent with the objects of  
this corporation, or the welfare of same.  
Said Board of Directors shall employ  
all officers or agents, servants or clerks,  
they may deem necessary for the con-  
duct of said business.

### ARTICLE VI

This Charter may be changed, modi-  
fied or amended; the capital stock in-  
creased or decreased or same may be  
dissolved at a general meeting of the  
stockholders convened for the purpose,  
with the assent of three fourths of the  
capital stock present or represented at  
such general meeting. In case of disso-  
lution or termination of this corporation  
by limitation or otherwise, the liquida-  
tion of its affairs shall be conducted by  
three commissioners, selected from the  
stockholders at a meeting called for  
that purpose, as above set forth. Said  
commissioners shall remain in office un-  
til the affairs of said corporation shall  
have been fully liquidated. In case of  
death of one or more of said commis-  
sioners, the survivors or survivor, shall  
continue to act.

### ARTICLE VII

No stockholder of this corporation shall  
ever be held liable or responsible for the  
contracts or debts thereof in any further  
sum than the unpaid balance due the  
Company on the shares of stock subscrib-  
ed for or owned by him, nor shall any in  
formality in organization have the effect  
of rendering this Charter null, or of ex-  
posing the stockholders to any liability  
beyond the unpaid balance, if any, of his  
stock.
